More Brooders Slated For Poultry Industry

An increased allocation for brooders is in prospect, according to Congressman Harris Ellis, worth of Roseburg, who reports he has contacted the farm machinery division of the WPB relative to complaints of poultry men regarding inability to secure brooders. The department of agriculture has made request for manufacture and distribution of additional brooders and allocations have been increased from 136,000 to 300,000, Congressman Ellsworth reports. The latter figure is only slightly below the 1940 and 1941 averages.
