Oregon Flier Downs Jap Bomber, Dodges 11 Zeros

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16—(AP)—First Lieutenant Rex T. Barber of Culver, Ore., has been credited by the war department with destroying a Japanese bomber near Guadalcanal without any interference from 11 enemy Zero fighters.

Barber, the report said, was shielded by a cloud from the Zeros just above him when he and his wing man, flying at about 8,000 feet, spotted a Mitsubishi below them. The two did not see the Zeros above and dived their Aircobras at the heavy bomber. A direct hit from Barber's guns set the enemy plane afire and it crashed into the sea a few hundred feet off shore.

The Zeros failed to note the combat and by the time anti-aircraft fire from their base brought them to the alert, Barber and his mate were streaking for their home base.

Cougars Again Top Hoopsters; U. of O., O. S. C. Split Bill

The red hot scramble for the northern division Coast conference basketball title, tied in knots for the last two weeks, appeared to be on the verge of becoming even tighter today as Washington prepared to open its final series away from home on the University of Idaho court tonight.

The Washington Huskies, driving for the top with all their might, are half a game behind the Washington State Cougars after the clubs split a two-game series at Pullman Friday and Saturday.

The Huskies won the first game, 61-52, to put them half a game in the lead, which W. S. C. reclaimed the following evening with a 53-49 victory of their own.

Washington, with six wins and four losses, will just pull even with the Cougars, on a percentage basis if they can win twice from Idaho. The Vandals, improving steadily, still seem to drop always a few points short and have won but one game in nine starts.

W. S. C., however, meets Idaho for a single game at Pullman Friday night, and on the basis of

performances, should pull ahead again to a slim percentage lead even if Washington takes both its games. W. S. C. had won six and dropped three.

Meanwhile, the two Oregon clubs—University of O. and Oregon State—will transfer their personal feud from Eugene to Corvallis for a two game set-up Friday and Saturday. The two teams split their Eugene engagements, Oregon State taking the first, 56 to 36, and Oregon annexing the second, 50 to 35.

Oregon, with seven wins counterbalancing five losses, is still a definite factor in the title scramble, and should the webfoots turn hot to clean the O. S. C. series, they would be within a fraction of a per cent of first position.

Oregon State, the defending champions, on the other hand have only a mathematical chance for retaining their titles and will need to do a lot of winning with mighty little losing from here on out to repeat.

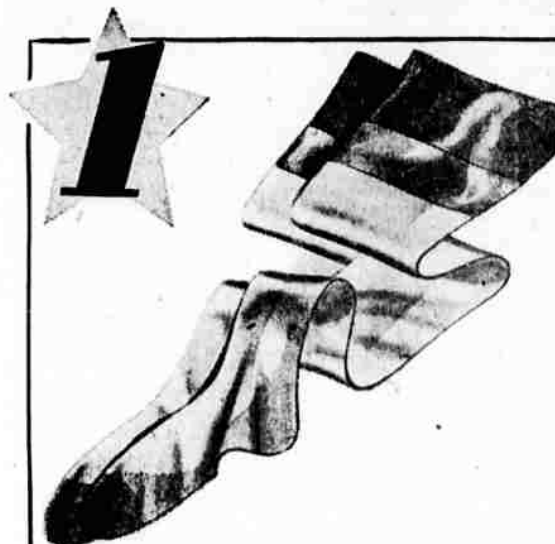

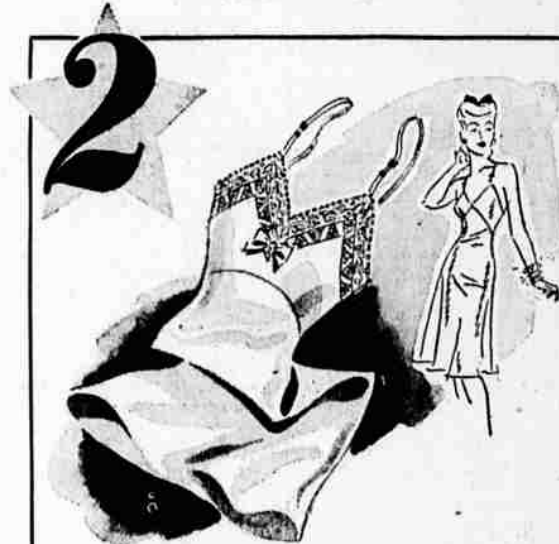

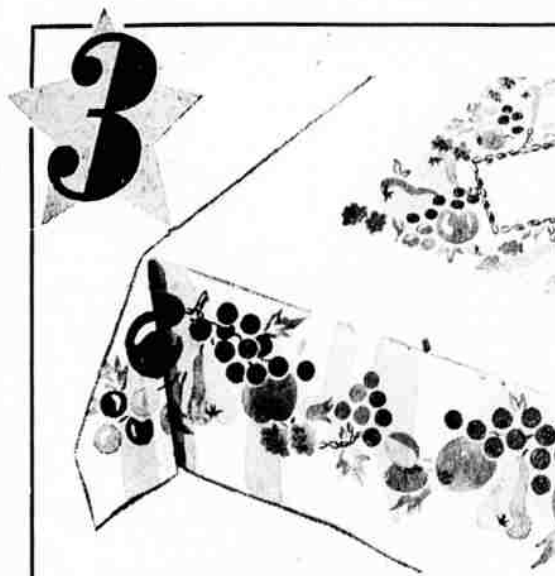
