The FPC, listing cost of the company's plant at \$27,914,210 as of Jan. 1, 1937, said the "amount to be disposed of represents about 18 per cent in excess" of that figure.

Onion Sets Placed Under Price Control

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—(AP)—Onion sets, used for planting onions, were placed under price control for the first time today. Acting with the approval of Agriculture Secretary Wickard, OPA decreed that for the next 60 days onion sets may not be sold at prices higher than those between February 10 and February 14.

The agency explained the regulation was issued to thwart an effort of many growers to hold onion sets off the market in anticipation of a sharp rise. Last year a bushel of onion sets, which in normal times costs about \$1.50, sold as high as \$15.75 at the end of the season in May.

The temporary price regulation, to be supplanted with other rules later on, is expected to give growers an average of about \$5 a bushel.
