Huskies Wallop Idaho Again, Gain Tie at Top Rung

MOSCOW, Idaho, Feb. 17.—(AP) Washington is perched alongside Washington State today on the top rung of the northern division basketball ladder following the Huskies' 72-34 victory last night over the University of Idaho, their second in as many nights.

From here to the end of the season, however, the trail will be much smoother for the Huskies than for Washington State. They have but four games left to play, all of them on their home floor.

Two are against Idaho and it shouldn't be taking too great a risk after taking testimony at the series just closed to count these contests on the credit side. The other pair is against Oregon State, and with Don Durand and Don Cecil back in form these two can be tough hurdles.

The Cougars, on the other hand, have seven more games and only one of them, against Idaho, on their home floor. Besides this they have two against the Vandals and the annual Oregon invasion for pairs of tilts with Oregon and Oregon State. Captain Owen Hunt, moreover, will be in the army. The first of the three Idaho battles is at Pullman Friday night. In other weekend games, Oregon meets Oregon State Friday and Saturday at Corvallis and Eugene respectively.

Joe DiMaggio Goes Into U. S. Army

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 17.—(AP) Joe DiMaggio reported for induction into the U. S. army today expecting to become a \$50-a-month private before nightfall. The New York Yankees' \$43,750-a-year star, 28, married and classified 3-A, applied to his local draft board for voluntary induction.

"When I get in that khaki I'll have my first peace of mind in over a year," said the two-time American league batting champion, holder of the consecutive game hitting streak (56) and twice acclaimed the most valuable player of his league.

"So will Dorothy (his wife). It's been kind of rugged for us, but it's all turned out as I prayed it would, and I'll be happy when Joe DiMaggio, the baseball player, becomes just another Joe in Uncle Sam's army."

The possibility that DiMaggio intended swapping uniforms cropped up several weeks ago after he effected a reconciliation in Reno, Nev., with his wife, former Dorothy Arnold, one time radio and night club singer.

Leghorn Broilers Offer Chance to Increase Income

Raising Leghorn cockerels for sale as 14-pound broilers offers an opportunity this spring for Oregon farmers to help hasten the defeat of the axis while adding a bit to their own income, says J. Roland Parker, county agent. This year not only are more eggs needed, but substantially more poultry as well to help relieve the meat shortage.

"The poultry industry in the United States has been requested to produce 8 per cent more eggs in 1943 than in 1942, 15 per cent more turkeys, and 28 per cent more chickens for meat," says Mr. Parker. "To approach these goals will require all-out production on the part of everyone who can make room on his farm for a few more chickens."

In Oregon most of the White Leghorn chicks raised for flock replacements are purchased as day-old sexed pullets. This means that hatcheries have the problem of disposing of a large number of day-old Leghorn cockerels. Unless purchasers can be found for these cockerels they have to be destroyed, which is an economic waste right at a time when meat is the number one requirement in the food production program.

The experience of poultrymen, as well as careful tests made at Oregon State college, reveals that producers who have the equipment can well afford to raise these White Leghorn cockerels at present prices for day-old chicks, feed, and the finished broilers.

Noel Bennion, extension specialist in poultry husbandry, reports that Leghorn cockerels will make gains as economically as any of the heavier breeds up to 11-pounds which is the desired

weight for broilers. The larger breeds do make more economical gains when held to fryer size, 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 pounds, or to roaster weights, 3 1/2 to 4 1/2 pounds. While it is true that the government is interested in obtaining increased production of the heavier chickens, there is every reason, in view of the shortage of meat of all kinds, for Oregon producers to make use of these otherwise waste chicks in producing broilers. These will doubtless continue to be much in demand at ceiling prices, says Bennion.

Unions, Railways Don't Agree; Mediation Next

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—(AP) Wage negotiations between representatives of railroads and 350,000 members of five operating brotherhoods were terminated today without agreement and the services of the nation (railway) mediation board were invoked jointly by both sides.

Mediation processes will be instituted in Chicago tomorrow. The union wage demands were for a 30 per cent pay increase or a minimum raise of \$3 a day.

Local Adjustments in Milk Prices Ordered

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—(AP) The OPA authorized today some local adjustments of its new milk price regulations. Regional administrators were authorized to raise prices paid to farmers for fluid milk in those localities "where a producer

price can be increased without the necessity of increasing either wholesale or retail prices because the distributor's margin is adequate to absorb the increase in production prices."

Similar adjustments were authorized in milk marketing areas whose prices may be sufficiently below the prices of a neighboring area so as to cause farmers to ship milk out of their own area.
