CHARIVARI GIVEN BY MR. AND MRS. BENSON ON MONDAY EVENING

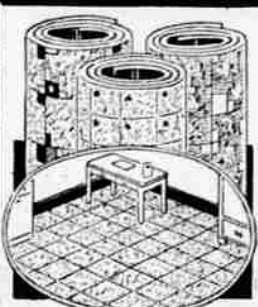

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Registration for Ration Timed At Douglas Places

Additional information concerning details of registration for ration book No. 2 was received today by Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent, who is in charge of arrangements for registration outside the city of Roseburg.

The Glendale board reports it will receive applications daily from 3:30 to 6 p. m. and from 7 to 9 p. m., except Friday. School will be dismissed Friday afternoon and rationing activities will be conducted between 1 and 5:30 p. m. There will be no evening registration Friday. Declaration blanks have been mimeographed and are available upon request at the school house.

The Western Auto Supply company store at Roseburg has been officially designated as the local receiving station for shotguns wanted by the army. The army is endeavoring to secure 12-gauge shotguns, either pump or automatic. Western Auto Supply stores have been made receiving and appraisal stations. Gun owners may submit their guns for appraisal and will be advised of the price that will be paid. They will have the right to reject offers if not satisfactory. The maximum payment will be \$50. If the gun is sold, a receipt will be issued by the store, Jack Davis, manager, reports; a report will be made to Portland army headquarters and a check will be mailed directly to the owner from that station.
