New Ambulance In Service Here



The Douglas Funeral Home of Roseburg announced today purchase of a new ambulance, to be known as "The Douglas Rose."

The equipment, illustrated above, arrived Saturday and has been put into service, and is available for day and night operation.

Distinctive in appearance, the ambulance is fully equipped with all emergency items, including first aid supplies, splints, hot and cold water, modern cot, and basket for the first ride of infants from hospital to home.

The interior is white leather throughout with extra large doors, two chromium spring-seat chairs for attendants, comfortable cot, with complete set of new sheets and blankets. The exterior is finished in an attractive rose color, from which the name "Douglas Rose," was derived.

The equipment, the management states, has been secured in order to give complete service in meeting the need of the ill as well as in accident cases. Operators will be maintained to provide service at all hours.

RHS Hoopsters Down Ashland 2nd Time; 33-27

The Roseburg high school Indians won their last basketball game of the season on the home court Saturday night defeating Ashland 33 to 27 in a game which forced the Redskins to extend themselves in the last few minutes of play to fend off a belated drive by the Lithians. Roseburg led 21 to 14 at half-time and 27 to 20 in the third quarter. Ashland unleashed a determined drive in the fourth frame and crept up to within two points of the Indians at 28-26. Roseburg added five points, however, and then protected the narrow lead by a successful stall in the last two minutes of play.

The Indians have two games left to play, both against Grants Pass and on the latter's floor. By winning both games Roseburg could go into first place, as a result of the defeat administered the Cavemen by Medford last week. The two games at Grants Pass will be played next Friday and Saturday nights.

In the game here Saturday night Roseburg's superiority in height was again used successfully in controlling backboard rebounds, but in the latter stages of the game Ashland's ball hawking improved to make recoveries about even.

Indians Have Good Chance to Vie In Playoff for Title

By virtue of a double victory over Ashland Friday and Saturday of last week, the Roseburg Indians retained an opportunity to go to the district championship play-off scheduled to be held at Ashland, Friday and Saturday, March 5 and 6. The Indians play two games at Grants Pass Friday and Saturday of this week and need victories in both games to win the championship. Standings in the league are as follows:

Roseburg and Grants Pass meet this week for their final two games, while Medford and Ashland, each with one game

left to play, will tangle at Ashland. If Roseburg could win both games at Grants Pass, the Indians would have undisputed possession of the league championship. If, on the other hand, Grants Pass wins one of the two games, the Cavemen are sure of the top honors. A good deal also depends upon the outcome of the game at Ashland, for if Medford should lose to the Lithians, the Pear Pickers will be out of the running. However, if Medford should win from Ashland and Roseburg takes one of the two games from Grants Pass, Roseburg and Medford would then be tied for second place in the league.

The second place position is important, because the runner-up in the league will still have a chance at the district championship.

Coos, Klamath Included
Under the rules of the zone play-offs, there will be one team from Coos county, the winner of the playoff to be held Friday of this week; two teams, the champion and runner-up from

the Southern Oregon league, and Klamath Falls, in the contest for the district No. 7 finals at Ashland, March 5 and 6.

Consequently, if Roseburg and Medford should go into a tie for second place, a play-off will be required to determine which of the teams shall enter the district tournament in the finals at Ashland.

Coach Turner is putting much stress on the importance of beating Grants Pass twice this week and will give the Indians some special work in preparation for the contests in which Roseburg will be at a disadvantage by playing away from home and in the small gymnasium at Grants Pass.
