Parolee Arrested on Charge at Reedsport

W. E. Lytle, 37, wanted at Reedsport on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses, was returned to Roseburg last night from The Dalles, where he was arrested Friday, and will be taken to the Reedsport justice court tomorrow for preliminary arraignment, Sheriff Cliff Thornton reported. Lytle, the sheriff said, is on parole from the Oregon state penitentiary, where he was serving a sentence for obtaining money by false pretenses, the sheriff said, and he is to be

returned to the penitentiary as a parole violator, with the possibility that an additional penalty may be imposed for the alleged offense at Reedsport.

He has been sought for several weeks, Thornton said, after allegedly cashing a check given by a mill company for payment of an assigned claim for meals.

Necessity For Full Sign-Up for Food Pointed Out

The absolute necessity of complete registration for war ration book number two was emphasized today by J. W. Mess, president of the Roseburg chamber of commerce, following conference with state OPA officials. The chamber president pointed out that it will be impossible for anyone without a ration book to get a square meal at home within a few days, since almost all canned, bottled, dried and frozen foods are covered by the new ration books. Fresh meats, he said, will be rationed through the same books.

Of equal importance, the chamber executive pointed out, is the fact that future allocations will be made to Oregon on the basis of the "census" of population to be provided by registration for the new ration book. Present allocations are made by the OPA on the basis of the 1940 census, now seriously outmoded in many areas where population has reached new heights under the impetus of war industry.

Chambers of commerce throughout the state are undertaking the registration campaign at the request of Richard G. Montgomery, district OPA director.

Charles Lutman Found Dead at Lookingglass

Charles Lutman, aged resident of Lookingglass, was found dead at his home this morning, Sheriff Cliff Thornton was advised shortly before noon today. Lutman reportedly had recently been in poor health. When no activity was noted about his home today, George and J. W. Waggoner and Walt Edmonds, neighbors,

investigated and found the elderly man dead. Deputy Sheriff Bud Carter and Coroner H. C. Stearns went to Lookingglass to make the required investigation.

Highway Maintenance Jobs Filled by Women

REEDSPORT, Ore., Feb. 23.—(AP)—Three women have taken the places of men on the state highway department maintenance crew here under Foreman W. H. Park.

Park said he believed it was the first time in the state's history that women had become members of a maintenance crew though not the first time women had worked on department construction operations. Three women at one time were employed on a paving crew at Marshfield, he said.

The women on Park's crew are Mrs. Ray Willard, truck driver, and Mrs. Irene Abbott and Mrs. Laura Edwards, laborers.

Zuckerman Trial Judge Disqualification Asked

STOCKTON, Calif., Feb. 23.—(AP)—A decision on disqualification of Superior Judge C. W. Miller was awaited today at the start of the second trial of Maurice Zuckerman, 64, wealthy Stockton commission merchant, on murder charges.

The ruling will be made by Judge Miller himself. He presided over Zuckerman's first trial for the death of Otto Dander, 40, former local American Legion leader, in a cafe argument.

Convicted of manslaughter, Zuckerman served nine months in San Quentin prison. The state appellate court ordered a new trial in an opinion which referred to "erroneous and highly prejudicial instructions from the trial judge."

Woman Uses Pistol to Repulse Room Invaders

TACOMA, Feb. 23.—(AP)—Military and city police still are investigating today an attempt Sunday night by two men in soldier uniforms to invade the apartment of a Tacoma woman and her 9-year-old daughter. One of the men was shot by the woman,

Mrs. Don Wise, who drove the pair away, she told investigating officers, with shots from her husband's .22 caliber pistol.

Officers quoted Mrs. Wise as

saying the men had threatened both she and her daughter with physical harm.

Police said last night that no trace of the men had been found.
