Ration Registration Here Now Totals 2,746

Registration for food ration book No. 2 is continuing quite smoothly, and through the splendid cooperation of all registrants, very little waiting in line has been necessary. W. M. Campbell, city school superintendent, said today.

The most popular registration center has been the Junior high, where the total registration yesterday exceeded the combined registration at Fullerton and Benson schools.

Registration Tuesday was 1,501, which gives a total of 2,746 for the first two days. Distribution by buildings Tuesday was: Junior high, 590; Rose, 360; Fullerton, 286; Benson, 265.

Continuing the alphabetical distribution of registrants, those whose names begin with the letter I through M are urged to register today, between 1:30 and 5:30 p.m.; names N through S are asked to get their books on Thursday, and from T to Z on Friday. Registration centers in Roseburg will also be open on Saturday from 9 a. m. to 12 noon.

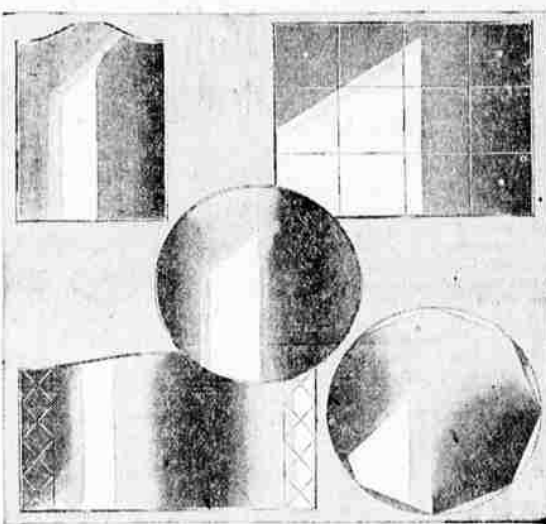

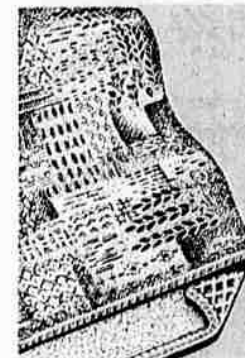
