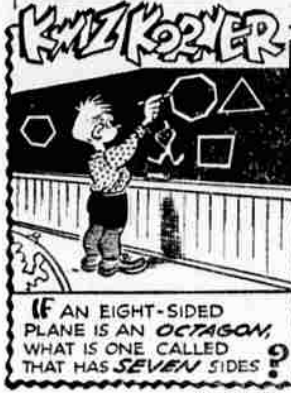

Ration Dates and Data

RATION BOOK NO. 2—Registration dates Feb. 22-27, inclusive. **SUGAR**—Stamp No. 11 in Ration Book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires March 15. **COFFEE**—Stamp No. 25 in Ration Book No. 1, good for one pound, expires March 21. **GASOLINE**—No. 4 stamps expire March 21.

TIRES—Inspection dates: Cars with A books, prior to March 31; B and C books, prior to Feb. 28. **SHOES**—Stamp No. 17 in Ration Book No. 1, good for one pair. Expires June 15.

PROCESSED FOODS—Rationing begins March 1. Retail sales cease at midnight, Feb. 20. C and B Gasoline ration books, dated to expire Feb. 28, must be returned to ration board within 10 days after expiration date. Application forms for supplemental C and B books to replace those expiring Feb. 28, obtainable at service stations. Books containing unused coupons or book cover, if all coupons are used, must be returned with application.
