New Act on Birth Registration Now In Operation Here

Several filings of petitions for birth registrations under the emergency measure recently passed by the state legislature already have been made. County Clerk Roy Agee announced today. The law, which was immediately enacted following affixing of Governor Snell's signature, provides that birth certificates may be issued by the state registrar upon authority of the circuit court.

Persons needing to establish date and place of birth may now file petitions with the circuit court. Forms of petition are available at the office of the county clerk.

News of Men From Douglas County In War Service

The News-Review today received from Captain Maynard Bell a copy of the Gibraltar Chronicle, a newspaper published at Gibraltar since 1801. The issue of Jan. 6, which Captain Bell sent to the News-Review, was given over to much detail of Russian victories. Captain Bell, former News-Review sports writer, is now serving in North Africa with an aerial bomber squadron, in which he holds an administrative position.

As one of twenty honor men at the naval air gunner's school, Jacksonville, Florida, Machinist's Mate Third Class Carl J. Lilla, 21, of Canyonville, received the commendation of his commanding officer at the graduation ceremony for his class in aerial gunnery. Lilla's training at the new naval school was concentrated on ordinance and aerial marksmanship. This course has prepared him to fight as a rear-seat gunner in the navy scout planes and torpedo bombers. Commander Edward E. Daleck, a Pacific battle veteran, now serving as commandant of the gunnery school, commended the twenty men for their concentration and application throughout the intensive training period. Lilla may soon be sent to one of the important war theatres for active combat duty.
