Outline Offered For Budgeting Point Spending

With actual shopping for processed foods under point rationing now in effect, the office of price administration today cautioned homemakers to spread their point "spending" as evenly as possible over the full month of March so as not to run short toward the end of the month.

There are 48 points per person to last a full month of 31 days, it was pointed out, and since point values are necessarily high housewives may unwittingly use up their points at a faster rate than they realize. The result of this "over spending" would be to create a family "shortage" toward the end of the month insofar as ability to buy rationed foods is concerned. This will be particularly true if housewives budget their point spending on the basis of four 7-day weeks which would leave 3 full days unaccounted for in March.

It is recognized, of course, that some families, especially those who live out of town, will wish to spend their family point allotment for two or three weeks, or even a month ahead. In those cases, the problem then obviously will become one of making the rationed foods acquired last for the full ration period.

To help those who wish to budget their "point spending" evenly over the full 31 days of March, OPA divided the month into four suggested shopping periods as follows:

March 1 through 8 (eight days)
March 9 through 16 (eight days)
March 17 through 23 (seven days)
March 24 through 31 (eight days).

This arrangement makes "point shopping weeks" begin, respectively on Monday, March 1; Tuesday, March 9; Wednesday, March 17; and Wednesday, March 24, in keeping with OPA's advice for housewives to shop for rationed foods early in the week.

If the 48-point per person allotment is used evenly over these periods, the rate of spending in each period by families of from two to eight persons work out in 12-point multiples as follows:

PHILADELPHIA, March 3.—The cruiser Astoria, named for one of three sunk in the south Pacific last August, will be launched Saturday at the Cramp Shipbuilding company yards.

The Astoria will be the 101st warship and the second cruiser to go down Cramp's ways since the outbreak of the war.

Mrs. Robert Lucas, daughter of Senator Merle Chessman of Oregon and wife of the editor of the Astorian Budget, will sponsor the Astoria.

State Bank Restricted In PUD Bond Buying

SALEM, Ore., March 3.—(AP)—Attorney General Van Winkle ruled today that Clatskanie PUD revenue bonds can't be bought by any state bank in amounts in excess of 10 per cent of the bank's capital and surplus.

Presumably, the limitations would apply to any peoples' utility district.

Alien Diplomats Interned in U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—(AP)—Former German and Italian consuls general at Algiers, their staffs and members of their families captured by the United States armed forces in north Africa, have arrived in the United States, where they are under guard in the Ingleside hotel near Staunton, Va.

The state department, in making this announcement today, said negotiations are under way for the exchange of these axis officials. They would be exchanged for officers of the United States and other American republics seized by the Germans in France and now held in Germany.

Meanwhile the axis internees in Virginia are not permitted contact with the public.

The state department said the American officials, together with members of their families, who were seized in the former occupied zone of France by the Germans, are being maintained in Germany under conditions corresponding to those of the German and Italian official group now in the United States.

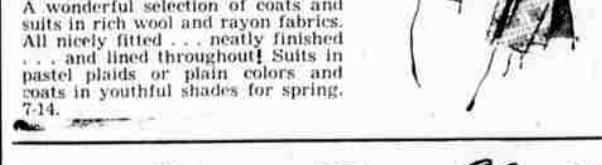
