Hybrid Corn "Tailored" For All Oregon Areas

Six different varieties of Oregon hybrid field corn are now being produced in Oregon, seed of which is available from Oregon growers, reports R. E. Fore, associate agronomist at Oregon State college. It is now possible to obtain hybrid field corn seed for practically any condition in the state where corn is grown at all.
A new circular lists Oregon Hybrid 100, which is a new hybrid produced at the agricultural experiment station in this state. It is being introduced principally because of its early maturity. It is recommended for growers using corn for hogging down or early fall feed, or for growers in areas where other hybrids are too late in maturing. At present, seed for this can be obtained only from the farm crops department at the college.

Ration Dates and Data

SUGAR—Stamp No. 11 in Ration Book No. 1, good for three pounds, expires March 15. Stamp No. 12, good for five pounds valid March 16 through to end of May.
COFFEE—Stamp No. 25, in Ration Book No. 1, good for one pound, expires March 21.
GASOLINE—No. 4 stamps in A book expire March 21.
C AND B BOOKS—Must be returned to ration board within 10 days after expiration date. Forms for renewal obtainable at service stations. Books containing unused coupons or covers of exhausted books must be returned with application.
TIRES—Class A—First inspection deadline March 31.
FUEL OIL—Period 4 coupons expire April 6.
INSTITUTIONAL FOOD USERS—Must register with local rationing board between dates of March 1 and 10.
RATION BOOK NO. 2—Applicants not listed in original registration may submit applications on and after March 15.
