Hybrid Corn "Tailored" For All Oregon Areas

Six different varieties of Ore-gon hybrid field corn are now being produced in Oregon, seed of which is available from Oregon growers, reports R. E. Fore, associate agronomist at Oregon State college. It is now possible to obtain hybrid field corn seed for practically any condition in the state where corn is grown at all.

new circular lists Oregon Hybrid 100, which is a new hy-brid produced at the agricultural experiment station in this state. It is being introduced principally because of its early maturity. It is recommended for growers using corn for hogging down or early fall feed, or for growers in areas where other hybrids are too late in maturing. At present, seed for this can be obtained only from the farm crops department at the college
