Basketball Bill In Spotlight In Oregon Districts

Basketball will be very much in the spotlight all over Oregon tonight and Saturday as the field of leading teams is narrowed in preparation for the championship tournament at Salem next week.

With southern Oregon contests scheduled at Ashland and Roseburg, Oregon City and Milwaukie are playing tonight at Oregon City, Pendleton and Bend will meet for the district 2 title, while B league eliminations will be held at Junction City, LaGrande and McMinnville.

At Ashland, Grants Pass meets Klamath Falls and Medford vies with North Bend tonight. Winners tonight will meet Saturday to determine which of the four teams will go to the state tournament.

Saturday night at Roseburg senior high school gymnasium, Powers and Central Point will compete for the southern Oregon B league district title. Both teams have imposing records and are reported to be equal to most A teams. A large attendance of Roseburg fans is being urged to lend support to the visiting players.

Top Film Honors Go to Jas. Cagney And Greer Carson

HOLLYWOOD, March 5 (AP)—James Cagney and Greer Carson, established thespians but newcomers to the "Oscar" roster, received the motion picture academy's awards early today for the best actor and actress performances of 1942.

Fifteen hundred guests at the academy's 15th annual dinner waited anxiously until well after midnight for announcement of the winners of filmland's most coveted honors, bestowed by ballots of approximately 11,000 motion picture people.

Cagney's award was for his role in "Yankee Doodle Dandy," a Warner brothers' film, and Miss Carson's for her performance in M-G-M's "Mrs. Miniver," the picture which was adjudged the best production of 1942 and which virtually swept the list of "bests."

Other major awards: Best supporting performance by an actor, Van Heflin, now an army lieutenant, in M-G-M's "Johnny Eager," best supporting actress, Teresa Wright, in "Mrs. Miniver," best directorial achievement, William Wyler, now an army major, for "Mrs. Miniver." "Mrs. Miniver" also was acclaimed the year's best written screen play and the best achievement in black and white cinematography. With "Random Harvest," it brought Producer Sidney Franklin the Irving G. Thalberg memorial award.

"Yankee Doodle Dandy" received the award for the best musical scoring, by Ray Heindorf and Heinz Roemheld, and for the best sound recording.

Conn Would Fight Louis To Boost War Bonds

PITTSBURGH, March 5 (AP)—Corporal Billy Conn said today he would like to fight Sergeant Joe Louis for the heavyweight title "for nothing"—the proceeds to go to the war effort.

Conn, home on furlough from Camp Lee, Va., expressed approval of a suggestion that the war department authorize a return match with victory bonds ranging from \$25 for bleacher seats to \$10,000 for ringside as the price of admission.

Salmon, Trout Limits Announced

PORTLAND, March 5 (AP)—Announcing 1943 bag limits as the start of the spring run of Chinook salmon was reported in the Columbia river, the state game commission today predicted fair to good fishing this weekend in the state's western streams.

Already the first salmon have entered the Willamette from the Columbia and rivermen predicted thousands of new anglers this year because of the meat shortage.

The commission announced the following bag limits:

Five salmon or steelhead over 20 inches in length daily and a possession limit of 10 from all open waters except the Columbia and its tributaries for which the limit remains the same as last year—three over 20 inches in length in any one day and not more than 10 in any seven days.

Six jack salmon, which may be taken the year around, under 20 inches in any one day.

Three trout over 10 inches in length in any one day but not more than six in seven days from waters open all year, mostly coastal streams.

The return bout promises to be one of the outstanding fights in many years. This time the match is scheduled for twelve rounds.

NEW YORK, March 5 (AP)—Fritz Zivic bumps into Beau Jack in a 12-rounder in Madison Square garden tonight, and if you believe the wise guys, fearless Fritz is going to be lucky to escape alive.

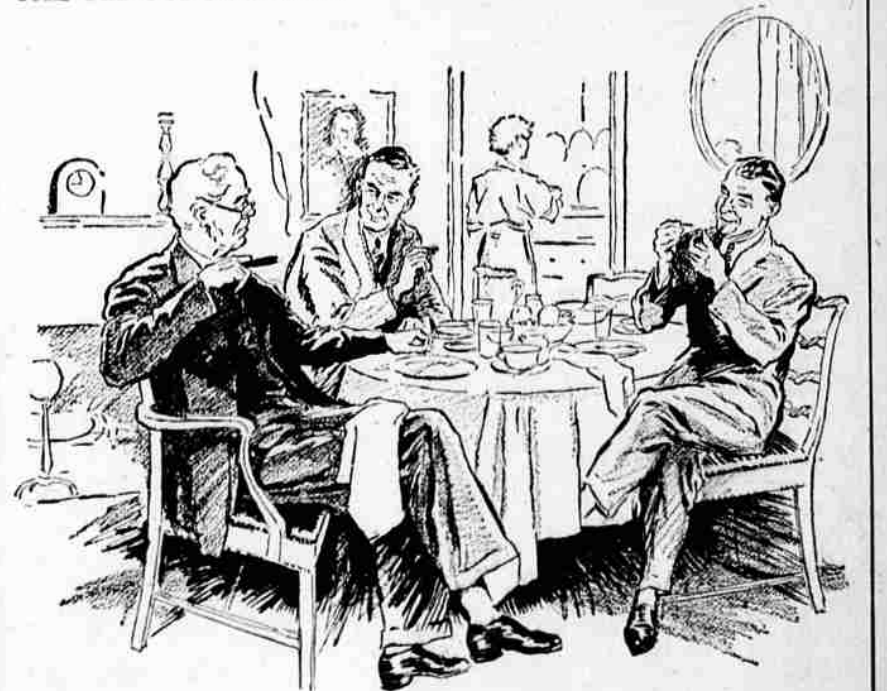
