Public School Bus Barred to Private Schools, Decision

OLYMPIA, March 16.—(AP)—The supreme court yesterday affirmed a lower court decision declaring unconstitutional a 1941 law extending privileges of the common school transportation system to private or parochial schools.

It is clear that the act contravenes the constitution in that it necessitates the use of common school funds for other than com-

mon school purposes, the court's majority opinion said.

"The act does not make a specific appropriation of school funds for carrying out its purposes, but, to carry out its purpose, the directors of school districts must, of necessity, resort to the common school fund."

The suit was instituted by Robert D. Mitchell on the contention the law violated the state and federal constitutions which declare that no public funds or property be appropriated for or applied to any religious worship, exercise or instruction, or in support of any religious establishment.

His complaint said school

buses were being used to transport pupils in the district, who are eligible to attend the district common school, to the Christian school, located in the same district.

except that the woman was younger than the applicant.

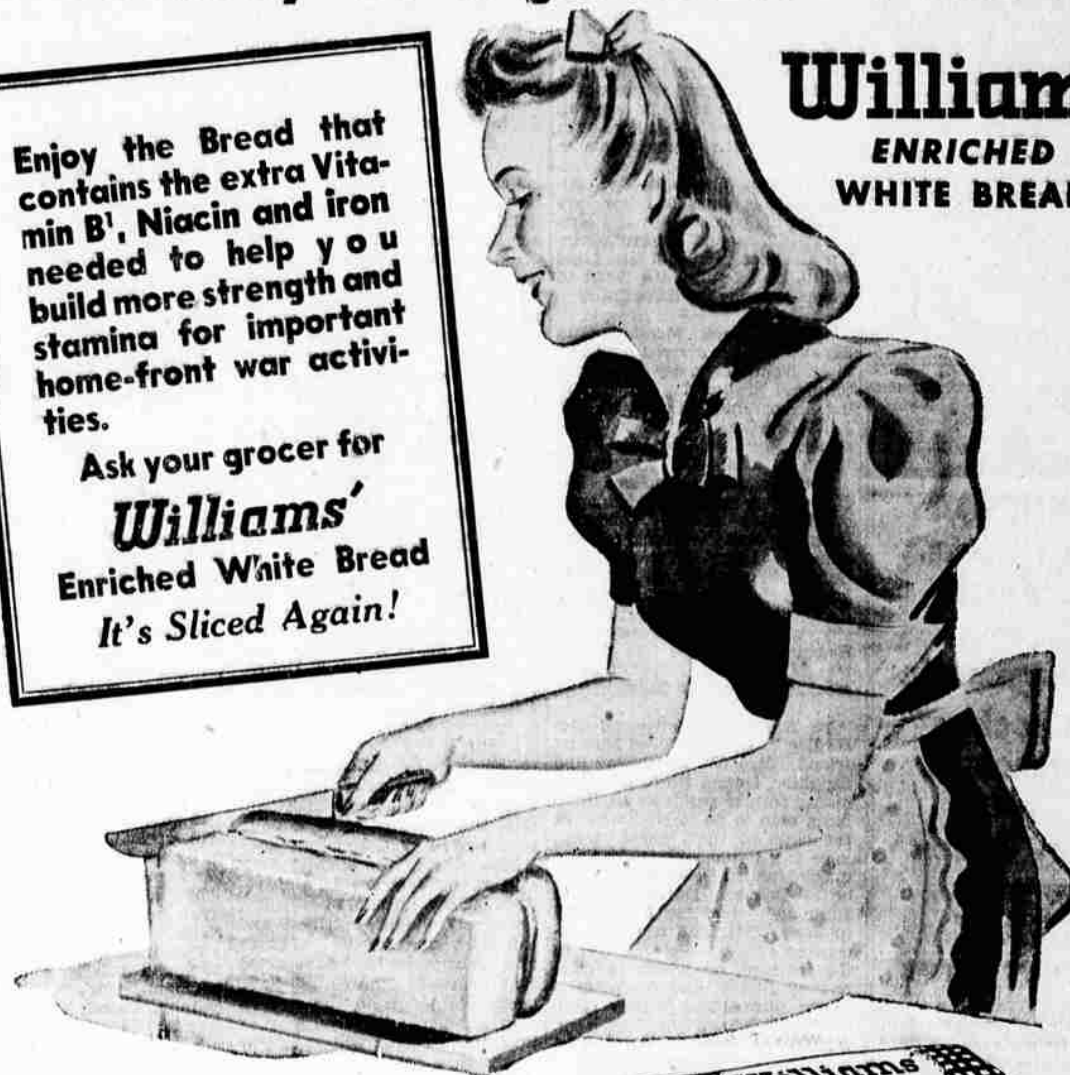

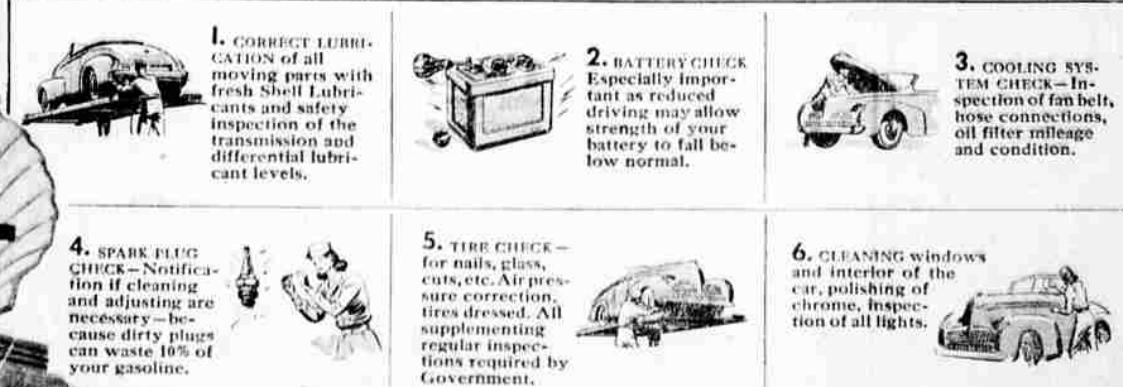
