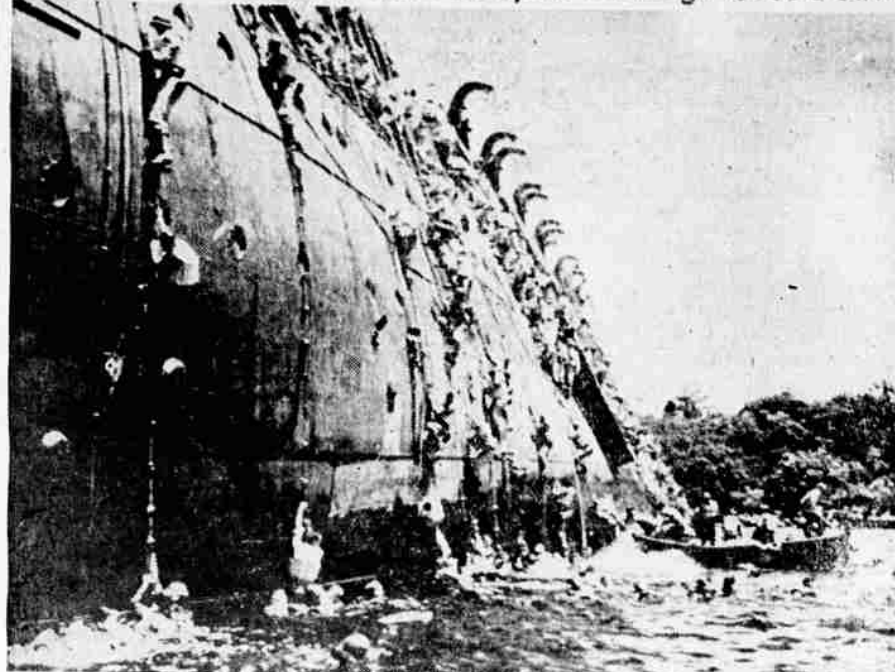

Zuckerman Freed In Armistice Day Killing of Dander

STOCKTON, Calif., March 17.—(AP)—Maurice Zuckerman, 64, was acquitted yesterday on a charge of manslaughter growing out of the fatal shooting of Otto Dander here on Armistice day of 1941. The acquittal was ordered by Superior Judge Raymond Coughlin at Sacramento immediately after final arguments. There was no jury.

As the judge announced his verdict Zuckerman leaped to his feet with the shout "praise the Lord!"

Then he sat in his chair and wept.

Zuckerman, wealthy produce broker, had already served nine months in San Quentin prison on manslaughter conviction in an earlier trial. Then the appellate court ordered a new trial on the grounds that the trial judge, C. W. Miller, had erred in instructing the jury.

Dander, American legion leader and utility company employee, was mortally wounded during a quarrel in a bar room here, in which he, his brother, Ernest, Zuckerman and H. E. Podmore of Honolulu, friend of Zuckerman, were principals.

Zuckerman declared he tried only to warn Otto Dander; that he did not intend to wound him.

DeGaulle Going to Algiers to Confer With Gen. Giraud

LONDON, March 17.—(AP)—The French national committee announced today that Gen. Charles DeGaulle was expected to leave shortly for Algiers to confer with Gen. Henri Giraud on cementing a union of all Frenchmen who are fighting the axis.

Giraud, French high commissioner of north Africa, called for such a conference in his speech Sunday repudiating the Vichy-German armistice and repealing Vichy's oppressive laws.

DeGaulle's headquarters received with unqualified satisfaction news of the resignation of Gen. Gerget, former Vichy air minister and Giraud's deputy for civil affairs.

He was one of four supporters of the late Admiral Jean Darlan, 40 whose presence in north African positions the Fighting French objected. They accused Bergeret of imprisoning and brutalizing hundreds of Frenchmen for refusal to accept the validity of the armistice and for continuing the

Income Tax Cut For Men on War Duty Explained

SALEM, Ore., March 17.—(AP)—Personal income tax returns filed with the state tax commission by any man or woman member of the nation's armed forces, including joint returns of husband and wife filed by either, will be allowed the additional \$3,000 exemption voted by the recent legislature in house bill 146, signed during the session by Governor Snell, Earl L. Fisher, commissioner in charge of the income tax division, said today.

Declaring that the tax revenue thus lost to the state would be a definitely noticeable amount, since income from civilian employment prior to entering the service is included, Fisher refused to estimate what that amount might be.

The measure provides a deduction of \$3,000 over previous exemptions allowed by loss from net income after December 31, 1941, in computing amount of income and intangibles taxes. Oregon's intangibles tax has been "dead" for four years, Fisher pointed out today.

Absenteeism Curb Bill Given Committee O. K.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—(AP)—A measure aimed at curb-

ing absenteeism among war workers was approved, 19 to 7, today by the house naval committee.

The measure, revised in executive session, would:

1. Tighten the selective service act to provide that an employer seeking deferment of an essential worker furnish draft boards with a record of how many times the worker was absent from his job.
2. Require the war, navy and merchant marine department and all war contractors to supply the department of labor with the names of all workers absent from work without prior authorization.
