Genial Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the 52-year-old Texas-born Kansan running the war in Africa, has had a long and intense career preparing for his historic task. Tanks and planes are his fetish. A year ago Washington made him chief of the war plans division and he laid out the scheme of global war under which America is attacking across two oceans. Later he commanded 220,000 troops in the Louisiana maneuvers. Then General Marshall chose him to be the Pershing of World War II. His GHQ "over there" has two doors and nobody knocks. Making friends with his corn-belt grin, he eats in the common mess hall, lives in a small bungalow with several other officers and a scotty dog he terms "somebody to talk to who can't repeat what I say if I say anything."



With his purchase by Toronto, Pete Gray, first one-armed player to crash organized baseball, also becomes first to make AA circuit. A product of the Pennsylvania coal country, Outfielder Gray led the Canadian-American League in batting last season with an average of .381.

Beer Strike in Hands of Labor Dept. Conciliator

SAN FRANCISCO, March 19. (AP)—San Francisco's beer strike was in the hands of a department of labor conciliator today.

Meantime, stocks of beer ran low in San Francisco taverns and it was estimated the supply would be virtually depleted by the coming week-end unless deliveries are resumed.

The strike of 1,800 to 2,500 brewery workers was called by the non-affiliated brewery truck drivers in an effort to enforce their demands for a closed shop. The employers countered that the dispute was only an extension of a long-standing jurisdictional dispute with the AFL teamsters' union.

Alexander Gives Hint

Meanwhile, a broadcast reported that Gen. Sir Alexander, allied field commander under Gen. Eisenhower, called war correspondents together a week ago and told them they would "hear something interesting within a week."

Authoritative confirmation was still lacking on German reports that the British 8th army had launched a climactic assault on the Marath (little Maginot) line in southern Tunisia, and the Nazi-controlled Paris radio said the 8th army's attacks had slackened.

While U. S. troops picked their way through mazes of booby traps and land mines planted by the Germans in their retreat from Gafsa, allied warplanes hunted down the Nazis and blasted enemy supply lines.

Military analysts said Gen. Patton's drive was part of a two-way squeeze to compel Rommel to stand and fight—instead of rapidly shifting his armor from sector to sector—or withdraw from the Marath line into northern Tunisia.

Restaurant Service to Negroes OPA Problem

PORTLAND, Ore., March 19. (AP)—An appeal to compel all Portland-Vancouver area restaurants to serve negroes was before

the OPA food rationing division here today.

The executive committee of the Hudson House council, composed of members of 13 dormitories in a Vancouver housing project, said some restaurants refused to serve negroes and others contributed to absenteeism by making negroes wait for long periods before service.
