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Pumpkin Classed as Fruit on OPA List

PORTLAND, March 20.—(AP)—For the present, at least, pumpkin is a fruit, the district OPA said today.

The latest vegetable-fruit controversy was brought into the open by a consumer who noted a No. 2 can of pumpkin would require 21 ration points. Then he consulted the dictionary and found pumpkin defined as "fruit of a vine," under which classification the same size can would cost only 15 points.

OPA found the same definition and said pumpkin could be considered a fruit until it received a contrary ruling from its legal department in Washington.
