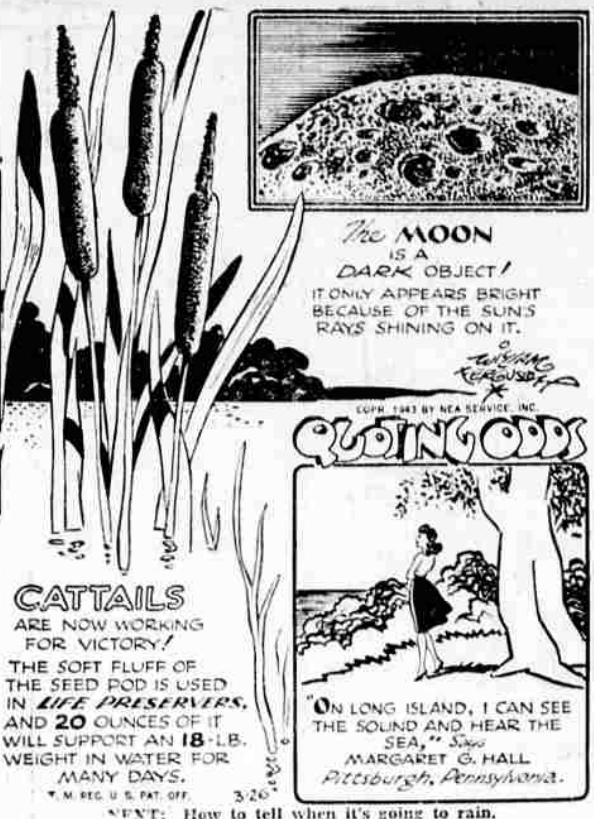

The pledge of allegiance to the flag during the reciting of the pledge of allegiance is no longer correct in accordance with recent congressional action. Joint

resolution to amend public law No. 623, relating to the display and use of the flag of the United States of America, was referred to the committee on the judiciary, whose recommendation changing the manner of rendering the salute to the flag during the giving of the pledge of allegiance was adopted. Section 7, as amended, now provides: "That the pledge of allegiance to the flag . . . be rendered by standing with the right hand over the heart. 'Henceforth, the right hand is not to be extended at the words 'to the flag,' but is to be held over the heart throughout the pledge."

There is an official service flag. "Immediately upon America's entry into the war, fifteen months ago, the Legion and auxiliary petitioned congress to adopt a regulation service flag. Upon passage of the Legion-sponsored flag bill by the house of representatives October 12 (the senate took action June 15), the secretary of war approved a design for a service flag, pin and lapel button. Regulations regarding their manufacture, sale and display will be forwarded Legion department officers upon release by the war department. The design: A blue star on a white field, bordered in red . . . a gold star replacing the blue in the event the person loses his life in the service of his country. There are no V's, silver stars, anchors or other symbols incorporated in the official design.

Ethel Anderson Given Duty in WAAC Unit

Ethel R. Anderson, 305 W. 3rd avenue, N., Roseburg, has arrived at Camp Folk, La., where she has been assigned to duty as a medical technician at the 41st WAAC training regimental headquarters. She received preliminary and basic training at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, before being assigned to active duty with the Women's Army Auxiliary corps. The newly activated 41st regiment is one section of the fifth WAAC training center, which also is opening units at Ruston, La., and Monticello, Ark., to train women to take over non-combat jobs with the army. Manned chiefly by WAAC officers and auxiliaries, the Camp Folk unit, to which Auxiliary Anderson is assigned, expects to receive its first recruits within the next few days.

Roseburg Teachers To Take Part In Radio Conference

The Roseburg teachers will take part in the Oregon teachers radio conference, which is being broadcast by the Oregon stations of the Mutual Broadcasting system from 3 to 4 o'clock next Monday afternoon, it has been announced by Superintendent W. M. Campbell. Special arrangements are being made for the local teachers to participate.

The state-wide radio conference takes the place this year of the annual Portland convention for the state's 7,800 teachers, the meeting being cancelled by the Oregon State Teachers association because of transportation and housing difficulties.

Among those scheduled to participate on the program are Governor Snell and Dr. J. F. Cramer, president of the state association and superintendent of Eugene public schools. Current educational problems will be presented during the one-hour radio program. This is expected to be followed by local teacher group discussions of the issues raised.

The program will originate in the studios of radio station KALE in Portland and will reach local teachers through station KRNR. Mr. Campbell has announced the following plans for the participation of local teachers: Students will be dismissed at 2:45 p. m. Monday, and the teachers from each building will meet as a group. After listening to the broadcast of the program, a discussion will be held by each of the groups. Teachers from districts surrounding Roseburg are invited to participate.

Tax Expert to Speak At Kiwanis Meet Here

F. H. Young, manager of Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc., of Portland, an authority on taxation, will speak before the Roseburg Kiwanis club at its next regular meeting, which will be held Tuesday, March 30. Mr. Young will discuss the work of the 1943 session of the state legislature, with particular reference to tax legislation. This will be an open meeting to the public and a special invitation has been

given the directors of the Douglas County Taxpayers league to be present. A meeting of the league directors will follow the Kiwanis club meeting.
