Court Refuses to Postpone Murder Trial of Folkes

ALBANY, Ore., March 30.—(AP)—The trial of Robert E. Lee Folkes, 20, Negro, dining car cook accused of the "lower 13" knife slaying of Mrs. Martha Virginia James will open April 7 as scheduled.

Circuit Judge Lewelling refused a defense motion to postpone the trial.

He granted Defense Attorney Roy Lomax's request for a copy of the autopsy report made by Dr. Joseph Beeman of the state police crime laboratory after Mrs. James, 21-year-old bride of a navy ensign was found, her throat slashed, in berth 13 of a Southern Pacific passenger train as it passed through Linn county.

The judge refused, however, to issue orders that Lomax be supplied with copies of statements made by Folkes to police in Los Angeles, where he was arrested, a copy of the statement Folkes made to officers after his return here, or a list of the passengers aboard the death car.

Lomax had charged that the state and Southern Pacific officials were withholding evidence that would deprive Folkes of a fair trial.

Lewelling said no order he issued would be binding upon persons not parties to the action against Folkes. He added that Lomax could ask the circuit court at Portland to force Southern Pacific officials to furnish him with a passenger list.

Price Rules For Refrigerators Issued by OPA

The Klamath Falls district office of OPA today announced several important changes in maximum price regulation 139, which controls prices to consumers of used household mechanical refrigerators. The revised regulation, which will become effective April 15, has been issued well in advance of that date so that dealers and consumers may familiarize themselves with its provisions.

Dollars and cents prices on 1940 or earlier models have in some cases been slightly raised, and because of the shortage of labor and materials the guarantee period for a reconditioned machine has been reduced from one year to ninety days. Ceiling on 1941 and 1942 models are placed at 70 per cent and 75 per cent respectively, of the manufacturer's list price, and provision is made for the addition of \$5 to any maximum price on sales made to consumers in the western states, including Oregon and California.

The new regulation also provides for specific dollars and cents monthly rental charges, which depend upon the ceiling price of the particular used refrigerator being rented. The monthly rentals range between \$2.50 and \$6 per month on popular models, but may exceed \$6 on certain large machines whose maximum price is higher than \$125.

Another very important change in the regulation makes its provisions applicable to sales by householders. Previously, only prices charged by dealers were governed, but the ceiling prices now apply to any sale by whomsoever made.

The local district office of the OPA has copies of the regulation available for inspection, and expects a supply for distribution within a few days. Persons interested in receiving a copy are asked either to call at the OPA district office, Main and Esplanade streets, Klamath Falls, or to send their request by mail.

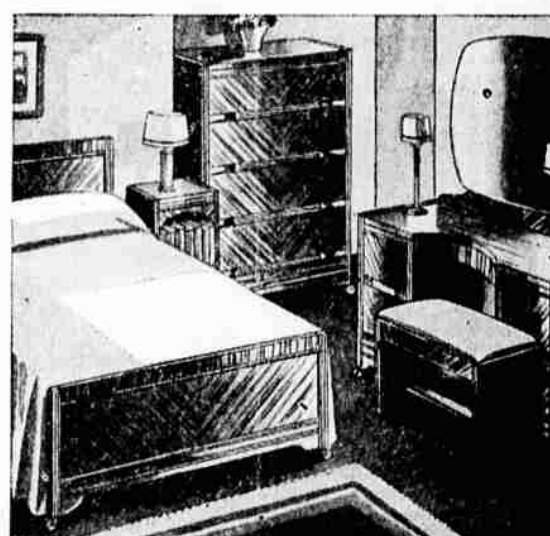

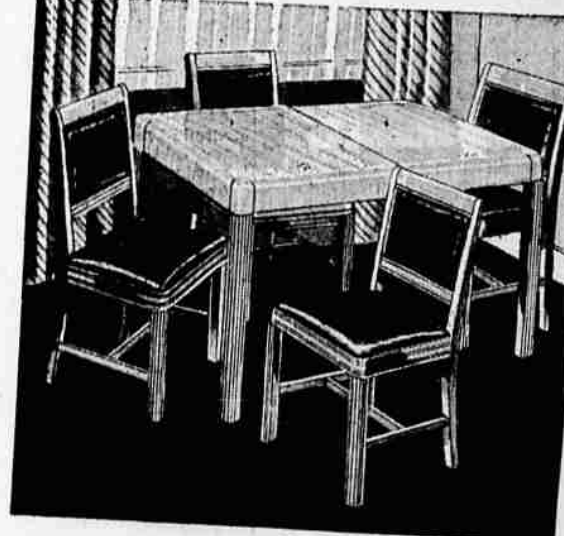
