Wyoming Cagers Win U. S. Title

NEW YORK, March 31—(AP)—The national collegiate basketball title, constant property of the Big Ten conference until Stanford broke the spell last season, is back in the far west for another season with Wyoming on the throne.

The Cowboys checked their ponies at the doorway of Madison Square garden last night but still had speed enough to wallop Georgetown, eastern representative, by 12 points, 46 to 34.

Both teams will remain here for Thursday night's double header, with Wyoming playing St. John's of Brooklyn, national invitational tourney winner, and Georgetown battling Toledo, second to St. John's in the preliminary to the Red Cross.

Ken Sailors, veteran forward, applied the spark that gave the far western outfit its deciding margin after the score had been tied 19 times, five in each half. He totalled 16 points.

Ammunition Blast in Italy Takes Heavy Toll

(By the Associated Press)
The Berlin radio broadcast a report from Rome today that an ammunition depot blew up in Naples last Sunday, killing 72 and

wounding 1,179 civilians and soldiers.

These casualties included seven Germans killed and 31 Germans wounded, said the broadcast recorded by the Associated Press. Admiral Cavagnari has been directed to determine the cause of the accident, the Berlin radio added.

Top Prices on Pork Need Not Be Posted

WASHINGTON, March 31—(AP)—Because of the new task of posting ration point values on meat, butchers need not post ceiling prices on pork cuts.

Under the new prices going into effect tomorrow, butchers were required to post on each tray of cuts not only the selling price but also the ceiling price. OPA said today the ceiling price now may be dropped because the customary celluloid markers used on meat counters will be filled up with the selling price and the ration point values.

The new pork prices effective tomorrow are part of an effort by OPA to standardize retail prices in the same types of stores in the localities. Similar standardized prices are scheduled for beef, veal, lamb and mutton but have not yet been announced.

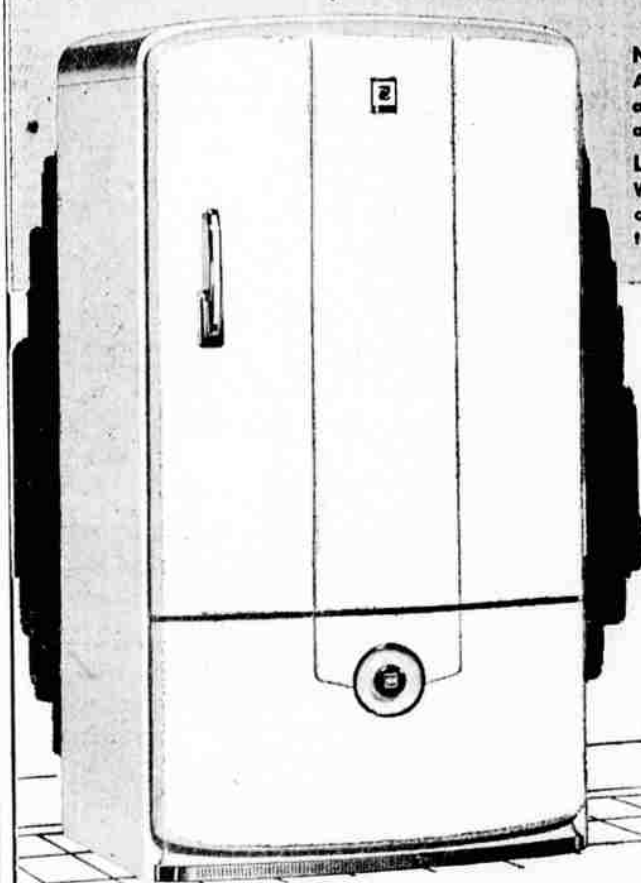

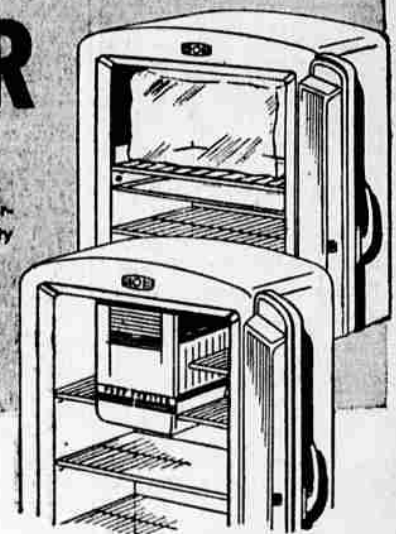
