New Allied Ships Exceed Losses In U-Boat Warfare

LONDON, March 31.—(AP)—A. V. Alexander, first lord of the admiralty, yesterday said that new shipping tonnage produced by the allies in the past eight months exceeded losses by "a good deal more than 2,000,000 tons."

Calling the U-boat "the most deadly menace of all," Alexander said the allies had a "very large number" of submarines at sea despite attacks on the enemy's building yards and operational bases.

"In the last six months there never has been a single day in which one or more attacks has not been delivered on U-boats," he said, adding that "very heavy losses" were being inflicted on the undersea fleet.

British light naval forces consisting of motor launches, motor torpedo boats and motor gunboats were now numbered in the hundreds in each of these sections, Alexander said, and British losses of submarines had been "more than replaced."

A foreign diplomatic source in London, who cannot otherwise be identified, meanwhile, reported from his contacts inside axis lines that Germany has decided to greatly increase her efforts at production of submarines as well as guns, tanks and transport equipment.

He reported that airplane production goals would remain at around 2,400 planes a month, although the reich has been able to produce less than 2,000 a month recently. Submarine production had been around 20 a month, this source added.

Deadline on State Tax Filing Moved to Apr. 15

State income taxpayers have until April 15 in which to complete and file their returns as a result of action by the last legislature in making income taxes payable quarterly. Heretofore tax returns were due March 1 and were payable on an annual or semi-annual basis. Some taxpayers, who had failed to take note of the new date, have been concerned by inability to secure forms for filing returns, local banks report. It is believed that additional forms soon will be available and taxpayers still have ample time in which to complete filing. Attention also is directed to the fact that men in military service were granted an added exemption amounting to \$1,000.

Ask Release Here Of Apprentices to Fill War Jobs

Employers who are utilizing boys from the local trades class of Roseburg High school will be requested by the Roseburg Apprenticeship commission to release the apprentices during the summer months, wherever possible, for essential war jobs, with the understanding that they may return to their training when school reopens in the fall. The commission's decision was reached at a meeting held Monday at which time Frank Chase, chairman; Bruce Mellis, secretary; Tom Parkinson, R. D. Coen, Bruce Elliott and Ralph Church, commission members, were in attendance.

A great many of the older high school boys will be needed in the forest service, lookout service and other essential war occupations during the school summer vacation period, it is stated, and wherever they can be spared from apprenticeship indenture, the employer will be requested to grant a leave of absence.

Use For Girls Cited

It also was suggested that employers in Roseburg should make use of the available supply of young trainees obtainable through the local trades program of the High school and that a large number of junior and senior girls from the high school could be trained for store, office and clerical work during the summer months and could continue during the school year on a part-time basis.

Further suggestion was made that if work permits can be secured for boys in the 15-year age group, it would be possible for them to obtain from two to three years of practical training on the job, working with experienced employers and employees as well as meeting the public, before reaching the age of military service.

Reports of former trades students now in military service included: Jack Gibbs, now lieutenant colonel in the army air force; Frank Norton, second lieutenant; Gordon Armstrong, aviation mechanic who was among the first 10 in standing in basic training and who was sent to the Boeing factory for special training on a new bomber; Sergeant Al Stone, aviation instruments mechanic; Ed Gardner and John Shearer, joiners at the Bremerton naval yards; Bob Russell, training at Davis college signal corps school, and William Weber in training at Farragut naval school, Farragut, Idaho.

Lieut. Fred J. Kinsel Here on Brief Leave

Lieutenant Fred J. Kinsel, former Roseburg city policeman, now an instructor in the army flying forces, visited here Wednesday and today on a brief leave. He recently was transferred from Stockton field, Texas, where he has been serving as a flight instructor, to Wickenburg, Ariz., where, as a squadron commander, he has been aiding in activating a new primary flight training station.

Kinsel enlisted in the R. A. F. in 1941, but returned from Canada to the United States to serve as a flight instructor in May, 1942. He anticipates a transfer in the near future to the ferry command.

A former member of the Umpqua Flying club, he reports that Ernest "Red" Sink, the club instructor; Henry Wurster, Joe Wisdom and other members of the local organization, are now in the ferry service, in addition to nearly a score in active combat units.

In explaining the army's urgent appeal for bandwomen, Col. Fulmer said many new band units were being activated.

Women, both vocationally trained and untrained, are needed immediately for non-combatant duty in all branches of the women's army to replace large numbers of soldiers who are leaving for combat duties in forthcoming offensive action.

After indicating their desire to join the WAACs by completing the application form, applicants may arrange with Mrs. Roselund for free transportation to and from Portland, where they will be sent for examination. The Roseburg recruiter may be contacted at 700 E. 6th street.
