

Washington Tax Hits Liquor Users

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 1—(AP)—Washington state hard liquor drinkers soon may see a tightening in the present rationing regulations, state liquor board members said in announcing that the new 10 per cent tax to consumers levied by the legislature would go into effect today.

Two factors may bring about stricter rationing, members said. Sales have increased at all Washington border towns, as Idaho, Oregon and British Columbia residents are coming to Washington to make purchases. Also, wholesalers now are inclined to tighten up on deliveries.

The new liquor tax is estimated to produce about \$3,000,000 annually. Half of these receipts will go to cities, 15 per cent to counties, and 35 per cent to the state. Present ration rules permit the bearer of a liquor license to purchase a quart or fifth each of Bourbon and Scotch a week. Rums, brandies, wines and cordials are not restricted.

Work Week Placed On Basis of 48 Hours

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outright discharges to men 28 years and older. Instead, men released for work in agriculture or essential industry are to be transferred to the enlisted reserve. This means they can be recalled to active duty at any time.

National WMC officials expressed satisfaction with early reports on 48-hour week results. They said they had foreseen that the longer work week already prevailing in the 32 areas would mean that few employees would be released for other work.

"They said the purpose of the order would be effected by cutting down the labor requirements of concerns which would have to tap a tight labor market for more workers in order to follow a 40-hour schedule."

No reports were available on what pay adjustments are being made by employers not covered by wage-hour laws or labor agreements. The order, as interpreted by the WMC, requires payment of time and one-half after 40 hours only by those so covered.

Air Score Favors Allies

It was officially announced that the axis lost 31 aircraft in combat yesterday with the allied North African air forces, while 12 allied planes failed to return.

American Warhawks, supporting U. S. ground troops in the El Guetaria pass area, destroyed 10 enemy planes for a loss of one of their own.

The Flying Fortress-Lightning assault upon Gagliari, 140 miles north of the axis-held naval base of Bizerte, crippled a major port for the dispatch of both planes and ships to the armies of Marshal Rommel and Col. Gen. von Arnim.

Of the five merchant ships hit, two were left afloat. Schooners, coastal craft and motorboats were among others damaged by the raiders.

High explosives were loosed upon the factory districts, the waterfront, the railway freight yards, a passenger station, repair yards and a fuel pumping station. Fires raged in the debris and enormous columns of smoke arose.

Heavy machine-guns of the Fortresses cut down challenging enemy fighters one by one. There were so many of the big bombers in the formation that some crews had no chance to fire at the enemy planes.

During the 1942 African campaign, a British signal cypher "Rommel's panzers retire" was decoded as "Rommel's pants are on fire."

Other members of the committee are Robert Lucas of Astoria, who was appointed to replace Senator Merle Cheshman, who withdrew following appointment by the governor; Charles Eckelman, Portland; Walter Underwood, Astoria; Frank H. Strong, Eugene, and Pinniger. The committee also has requested attendance, Pinniger states, of Joseph Mapes, executive secretary of the Oregon milk control board, and Professor E. L. Potter of the dairy division, Oregon State college.

The Daily Mail said in a dispatch from Madrid that 350,000 tons of French shipping, immobilized in Mediterranean ports since the German occupation of southern France had been ordered sent to Genoa, Spezia and ports in Sardinia and Sicily.

"The obvious inference is that a Dunkerque fleet is being collected for Rommel," the Mail said. Emergency crews of Italians would man the ships, the paper said.

STOCKHOLM, April 1.—(AP)—A gigantic nazified manhunt

was reported under way today in Norway.

Reliable advice from that country said that anti-nazi groups hiding in the mountains and subterranean who blasted the Norsk hydro-electric plant at Rjukan were the quarry of more than 3,000 German occupation troops who left a week ago for Rjukan, Haugastol and Roedberg aboard three special trains.

A partial "siege" was reported in effect in Rjukan.

Meanwhile, the underground Norwegian newspaper "Fri Fagbevegelse"—free trade unions—asserted that up to 25 per cent of Norwegian labor remains away from the work bench, plodding illness, much of it caused by undernourishment. The newspapers said the food situation in Norway is bad.

(In London, Norwegian sources said there were reports that the Hardanger vacation district near the west coast of Norway would be closed beginning April 1, mirroring German nervousness over invasion threats against occupied Norway.)
