DOUGLAS COUNTY HEROES

EDITORIAL

THE news this week has contained the names of four Douglas county fighting men who have been awarded special honors in recognition of service to their country. These heroes are Sergeant Clarence L. Campbell of Yoncalla, Lieutenant Harry J. Hildeburn, Jr., Roseburg; Sergeant Calvin A. Patterson, Tenuille, and Private Hugh L. White, Dillard.

Sergeant Campbell, who was awarded the air medal several months ago when he shot down an enemy aircraft while serving as a machine gunner on a Flying Fortress, was given his third oak leaf cluster to be worn on the medal, signifying that he has made 15 successful round trips on bombing missions over enemy territory. There is little detail of his exploits in the necessarily restricted news report, but one can well imagine the adventure and the hair-breadth escapes which must have accompanied 15 bombing missions over Germany and the occupied countries.

Lieutenant Hildeburn received the air medal for making five sorties as a fighter pilot over enemy lines in North Africa. The news is filled with the brilliant performance of the American fighter pilots in their battle against the stubborn Afrika Korps, and the ability of the men of the air forces in maintaining superiority in the air has been the major contributing factor to the successes scored against Rommel, the Desert Fox. That Lieutenant Hildeburn has been an efficient member of this heroic force is shown by the award with which he has been honored.

Down in the heat and the mud of Guadalcanal, Sergeant Patterson, leading an advance patrol, made two hazardous trips along an exposed muddy ridge, risking the cross fire of enemy snipers. With automatic rifle fire he silenced the snipers, and with the aid of his squad, wiped out ten or more enemy fox holes. Such an exploit is accompanied only by the best of leadership and the greatest of daring and courage. He well deserves his award of a silver star medal.

The feat of Private Hugh L. White is another of those stories which make military tradition. A comrade had been wounded and was bleeding profusely from a wound in the stomach. Immediate first aid, obtainable only at the field hospital, was required. White volunteered for the job and carrying his wounded comrade on his back raced for the aid station. He was in the thick of enemy fire. Sniper bullets ranged about him. Mortar shells sent shrapnel screaming through the air. Then an explosive shell fell directly in his path. Deliberately he stood on the shell to offer through the rending destruction of his own body the only possible salvation of his already wounded comrade. Thank God, the shell was a dud; it failed to explode and he was able to reach safety with his suffering companion and is alive to wear the silver star he so richly deserves.

We at home in Douglas county take great pride in these men and honor them for their great bravery and adherence to the American military tradition. It seems only a few days ago that we knew them as carefree boys; playing basketball and baseball, unconcerned by the more serious affairs of life. But they were eager to join in the defense of their country when the time of emergency arrived and how well they have performed is evidenced by the tribute given them by a grateful nation.

Without detracting one whit from the honor due these men, it is only fitting that we consider as well those hundreds of other boys who also are in the service of their country. Some have already made the supreme sacrifice. Others are on the firing line upon all of the battle fronts. Perhaps some have performed deeds fully as meritorious as those who have won public acclaim but, in the heat of battle or in the solitude of their service, their feats have failed to be recorded. Some have had no opportunity for brilliant individual exploit. They have simply performed their duties as soldiers, sailors or marines. No higher service could be desired.

To those who have won the badge of distinction we give our congratulations. To every man in the uniform of his country we acknowledge our debt of gratitude. They are heroes all.

Bus Driver Averts Highway Tragedy

TOLEDO, Ore., April 1. (AP)—Lady Luck and a resourceful driver late yesterday saved a bus load of persons from death or serious injury, highway authorities disclosed here today.

Part of a 100-foot cliff near Clifton, east of here, dropped off yesterday onto the road. A one-way route was cleared and several automobiles drove over through. Came a Corvallis-Newport Oregon Motor Stage bus driven by "Shorty" Edwards of Newport.

As he inched his vehicle around the slide Edwards kept an eye on the menacing cliff. As he watched another segment broke loose, tons of dirt, gravel, trees and brush cascaded toward his vehicle.

Edwards jammed the bus in reverse and withdrew the vehicle from the path of the avalanche with inches to spare. The slide covered the road for a distance of 200 feet. A highway crew had the road reopened today.

A Lincoln county school bus was pressed into commercial bus service here to help handle heavy traffic caused by the storm.

WHY MOTHERS GET GRAY

News of Men From Douglas County In War Service

Mrs. D. C. Morgan, of this city, has received word that her son, Fred Engle is now taking his preflight training at the army air force school at the University of North Dakota. He was formerly employed at the Lockwood Motor company here.

"The natives here are a funny lot," writes Sergeant Elmore L. Hill from New Guinea to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Earl Hill of Roseburg. "There seems," he said, "to be all shapes and sizes, big and small. The young ones are sort of cute. They climb the coconut trees and get us green ones to eat. The milk is all that is good when they are green. The men wear a loin cloth, while the women have a piece of blupur or some piece of cloth around the waist. They are blacker than the ace of spades. Each tribe has its own village and they are only a few miles apart. They are all friendly toward us. We give them cigarettes for fruit, etc. Some of the natives understand a little English and somehow we get them to get the idea of what we want. They may look dumb, but they really are smart when it comes to knowing everything about the jungle." Sergeant Hill, who was a member of the Rose-

burg national guard company, has been in New Guinea for several months. His brother, Lloyd Hill, who has been serving as cook with the rank of sergeant, recently quit the cooking job and took a private's rating to get in to field service. Another brother, Lawrence, is also with the same company.

Mr. and Mrs. James E. Sawyers have received word that their nephew, Robert Kidder, has been promoted from first lieutenant to captain. He is serving with the infantry in Alaska. Commissioned a lieutenant in the infantry reserve after R. O. T. C. training, he was employed as an instructor in physical education in the state training school at Woodburn, when he was called into active service a year ago. He was sent immediately into Alaska and during the past few weeks has been serving as acting commander of his company during the absence of the captain. His promotion carried command of the unit. Captain Kidder is exceedingly anxious to get into action against the Japs, as his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Kidder, and a brother, Stanley, Jr., and the latter's wife are believed to be interned in the Philippines.
