Japanese Lacking to Fill Jobs in New York

NEW YORK, April 3.—(AP)—Two employment services report that more jobs are available to Japanese-Americans in the New York metropolitan area than there are applicants to fill them. S. J. Sakurai, proprietor of the Japanese American employment agency, declared yesterday that approximately 85 per cent of the families here that discharged Japanese servants after Pearl Harbor or saw them picked up by the Federal Bureau of Investigation are once more seeking Japanese employees.

He explained these persons feel that if a person of Japanese extraction still is free to seek employment that he must have passed the scrutiny of the FBI.

"I could do 100 times the business if I had the boys," said Jas. T. Oseuka, head of the Japanese employment agency.

Douglas Again Exceeds Quota on Bond Sales

Unofficial returns indicate that Douglas county has again exceeded its monthly war savings bond quota. H. O. Fargeter, chairman of the county war bonds staff, reported today. For the period ending March 23, the official return from the federal reserve bank at San Francisco showed sales amounting to \$85,031. This report did not include sales by county issuing agencies on which the official report will not be cleared from San Francisco until next week. The unofficial tabulation of these sales, however, indicate that they amounted to \$21,062.50, which would bring the total to \$106,093.50 as compared with the assigned quota of \$100,000.
