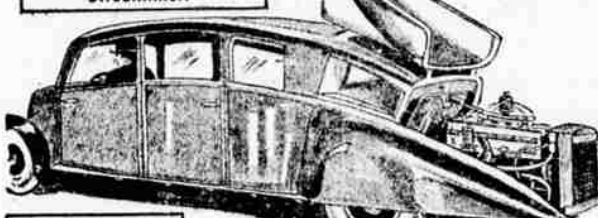

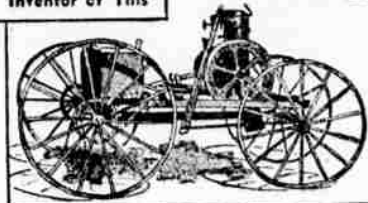

Where is the Front of This Streamliner?

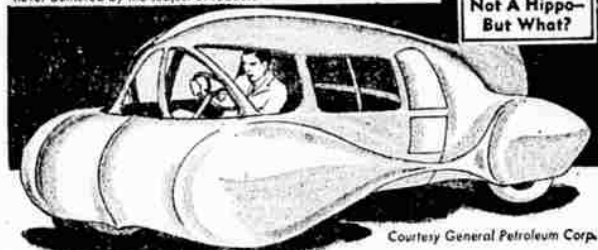


Tires Didn't Worry Inventor of This

Twelve Missing

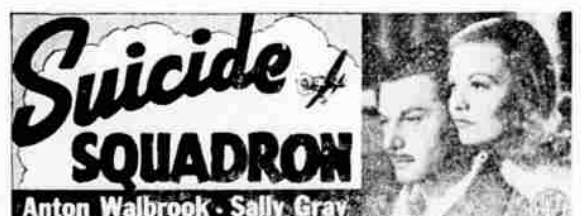
