Christian Science Simplicity Subject Of Lecture Here

"The nature of sin, its unreality, must be known before its effects may be scientifically destroyed," Herbert W. Beck, C.S.B., of San Francisco, member of the board of lecturers of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., declared last night in a lecture at the local church edifice. Speaking on the subject, "Christian Science: Its Simplicity," the speaker said, "All wrong desire is based upon sin, which would insist that man is physical."

"Sin is only a supposition, though it claims to be real, as real as an expression or emanation of divine Mind. That it is a supposition may be proved when God's allness and ever-presence as infinite good with no place for its opposite. Evil having no place, no reality, the truth may be realized that sin has no control or power over man, God's man. Also, the real man can have no sinful desires because of his perfection, because of his likeness to God."

"Sin is mesmeric. By it the sinner believes he receives good, if only temporal; he is convinced that it pays to sin; that one becomes more of a man for wrongdoing. All of us know how we have been cheated through listening to these deceptive suggestions."

"There is no real necessity for man to sin; no law of God makes it compulsory. In fact, God's man is not capable of sin, for man reflects or expresses his perfect creator. The real man's natural desires are for the good of God's giving. When the human is convinced away from the 'Dead Sea apples' full of sorrow and disappointment to the ever-satisfying, never-failing fruitage of rightful living."

"Recently a man walked unsteadily into a Christian Science practitioner's office and remarked that he was intoxicated. Following a short conversion, a treatment was given as we are taught in Christian Science. Several weeks later the man returned headed to express his gratitude and asked how his healing had been brought about. The practitioner replied: 'You told me you were drunk, intoxicated, but I

knew it was not true; that it was impossible for man as God's image to be drunk or intoxicated, because of man's present perfection and love of good.' 'Well,' exclaimed the former patient, 'your declaration was certainly proved true, for I am free from my desire for strong drink.'"

"Was not this reasoning simple, practical, effective? Was not the sinner purified when he was awakened to his true being?"

"It may be asked, Where did evil come from? One could answer that question if he could tell where ignorance comes from. We refer to the Christian Science textbook Science and Health, with Key to the Scriptures (p. 300), which declares: 'It is our ignorance of God, for divine Principle, which produces apparent discord, and the right understanding of Him restores harmony.' Ignorance, then, is the only thing to be rid of, and this you are doing every day. You are constantly finding out things you did not know a short time before, and what happens to the ignorance on the subject? Is anything destroyed? Assuredly not. You simply accept a fact which destroys ignorance about that fact. So in working out the problem of life, you are shown the way through Christian Science to a definite understanding of divine Principle and to discover the ease with which you may make use of that Principle in destroying the ignorance which is holding mankind in the depths of darkness."

Bombers of Increased Capacity Being Built

LONDON, April 7.—(AP)—Bombers which will carry twice the bomb load of the best present types and will travel farther and faster are going into production at two American plants, Sir Roy Fedden, chairman of the recent British air mission to the United States, disclosed yesterday.

The new planes will be turned out by Boeing and by Consolidated, he told a press conference. "We are putting in a strong recommendation that the RAF use one of these types," he said. He said American plants were also working on improved versions of the Mustang, Curtis P-40 and Airacobra and a new Douglas fighter.

Wool Growers Get Only "Support" Assurance

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(AP)—The nation's wool growers, who sought federal support for their market, failed to obtain, in the program announced Saturday, two of the three principal objectives of their proposal. They had asked the Agriculture department to (1) purchase the entire wool clip, (2) at a price which would include cost increases and (3) to continue that program for two years after the war. In the final agreement, all they got was assurance of government support for the current year only. F. R. Marshall, secretary of the

National Wool Growers association, commenting on the program, noted that the Commodity Credit corporation has indicated, in its formal announcement of the program, that it contemplates that of this year may be required for at least two years after the war and probably until the stockpile is liquidated. As to prices, he said merely that "the OPA has not yet given its official reply in this matter."

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Why Number 88 stopped at Pequop



We'll bet you never heard of Pequop, Nevada. But we know Mrs. Charles Moore of San Francisco has.

Mrs. Moore is the mother of Private Eugene Moore of the U. S. Marines—the man who was beaten, stabbed and mangled by a small army of Japs in the Solomons—and lived.

Lastbound on Southern Pacific's Train Number 88, Mrs. Moore had given up hope of seeing her son again, when a telegram from her husband was delivered to her on the train at Wells, Nevada. It said:

"GENE IS HOME. COME BACK."

Mrs. Moore ran frantically through the train, found the conductor and cried, 'I've got to get back—my son is home safe!'

Now conductors are used to emergencies, and they try to be as helpful as they can. But when Conductor Fred C. Snooks found out that the son was indestructible Moore of the U. S. Marines, he really went into action.

Quickly comparing his train orders, Snooks saw he would meet the first westbound train at Icarus, Nevada, but he knew he wouldn't be able to get his flagman far enough ahead to stop the other train in time. So he decided to take the siding at Pequop, a small station west of Icarus, and make the transfer there. It would delay two trains, but what of it? The important thing was to get Mrs. Moore back to her son.

Approaching Pequop, Snooks signalled his engineer to stop and take the siding. His head brakeman ran forward a quarter of a mile and flagged down the westbound train. Conductor Snooks transferred Mrs. Moore to the care of Conductor Linton and sent her speeding westward, back to her son.

This incident has nothing to do with Southern Pacific's part in the war effort. It simply shows that a railroad is more than trains and tracks—it is people. And no matter how busy or hard-pressed railroad people are, they are still human beings, and their hearts are in the right place.

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
