N. C. (Oscar) Rowland, well known Tenmile resident, died suddenly at his home Wednesday evening. The body was removed to the Roseburg Undertaking company parlors. Arrangements for services are awaiting arrival of relatives.

Can Collection Need Stressed At Roseburg Meeting

Every ton of tin cans currently being collected in the Roseburg area makes available for the war effort no less than 1700 pounds of copper and 20 pounds of tin. It was asserted last night by Rodrick Finney, executive secretary of the Oregon State Salvage committee.

Here to attend a meeting of the Douglas county salvage meeting, called at the chamber of commerce by Chairman Fred Goff, Finney explained that the cans first are sent to the detinning plant in South San Francisco, Calif., where the tin is removed by immersion in a solution and then is recovered through an electrolysis process.

Subsequently, the detinned cans are shipped to western copper mines where they are dumped in huge vats containing copper-impregnated water. Contact of the steel with the water sets up a chemical reaction with the result that every pound of can utilized precipitates three-quarters of a pound of copper for Uncle Sam's war production program.

Inasmuch as copper is America's No. 1 essential war metal for 1943, the importance of the one-way tin can cannot be emphasized too strongly, he added.

Demand Not Lessened
Also drawing attention at last evening's session was the continuing need for scrap metals during the coming year.

Emphasis in 1943 largely will be placed on the collection of farm and industrial scrap, and although no concentrated scrap campaign is planned in Oregon this spring, the need for this vital war material will be just as great in coming months as it was last summer and fall.

"Steel mills and foundries built up reserves to keep them going during the winter and early spring months," he said. "These reserves now are dwindling and before very long we can be assured that demands for scrap again are going to be made."

In conclusion, Finney paid high tribute to results attained by Douglas county salvage committees and the public at-large in "Getting in the Scrap" last year, declaring that "with your continued splendid response, Oregon should remain at the top or near the top of the nation in every respect in 1943."

School Children Praised
He also had particular praise for the efforts being put forth by

schoolchildren in all phases of salvage. "The young people of Douglas county and Oregon generally have done wonderful jobs in the collection of paper, scrap metals and now tin cans," he declared.

Those attending last night's meeting, in addition to Goff and Finney, included Marshall Penning, Roseburg city chairman; Ross Hutchinson, county civilian defense council chairman; W. M. Campbell, city superintendent of schools; Ernest Unrath, beverage dealer; M. C. Peterson and J. W. Doyle, waste material dealers.

County Chairman Goff reported a continuing need for cast iron, steel, non-ferrous metals, kitchen fats and rubber for salvage. Arrangements soon will be announced regarding a metals collection campaign to be conducted in Roseburg by high school boys, Goff said. Good results are being obtained in the Roseburg area he reported. Cans are being collected by the schools, with local beverage dealers, Ernest Unrath and Albert Micelli, collecting from the schools and arranging for shipment. Goff is urging all community chairmen to make immediate reports regarding their local conditions.

Charles Lyman Smith of Elkton Passes Away

Charles Lyman Smith, 87, died this morning, following a short illness, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Walter B. Haines, at Elkton. He was born in Iowa, March 14, 1856, came to Oregon 18 years ago and has since made his home at Elkton. Before coming to the west coast, he was in Boy Scout work in Pittsburgh, Pa. For a number of years he acted as a guide for hunting expeditions in Canada.

He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Haines, of Elkton, and a sister, Mrs. Emily Elser, of Lone Rock, Ore. Funeral services will be held Sunday at 2:30 at the Assembly of God church at Elkton, with Rev. Glenn Ayers in charge. Interment will take place at the Elkton cemetery. Stearns mortuary, Oakland, has charge of arrangements.

RATION Book No. 2
APRIL 4—Red stamps B (meats, fats) in book No. 2 valid; also unused A stamps; C stamps valid April 11; D stamps, April 18. All expire April 30. Each weekly series good for 16 points.
APRIL 30—Blue stamps D, E and F (processed foods) in book No. 2 expire at midnight.

SUGAR
MAY 31—Stamp No. 12, book No. 1, good for five pounds, expires at midnight.

COFFEE
APRIL 25—Stamp No. 26, book No. 1, good for one pound, expires at midnight.

SHOES
JUNE 15—Stamp No. 17, book No. 1, valid for purchase of one pair of shoes, expires at midnight.

GASOLINE
MAY 21—No. 5 stamps, in A book, each good for four gallons, expire at midnight.

MAY 31—Cars with C books must have tires inspected by this date; B books by June 30. First inspection for A bookholders must have been made by March 31; subsequent inspections within every six-month period thereafter, but at least 90 days apart. 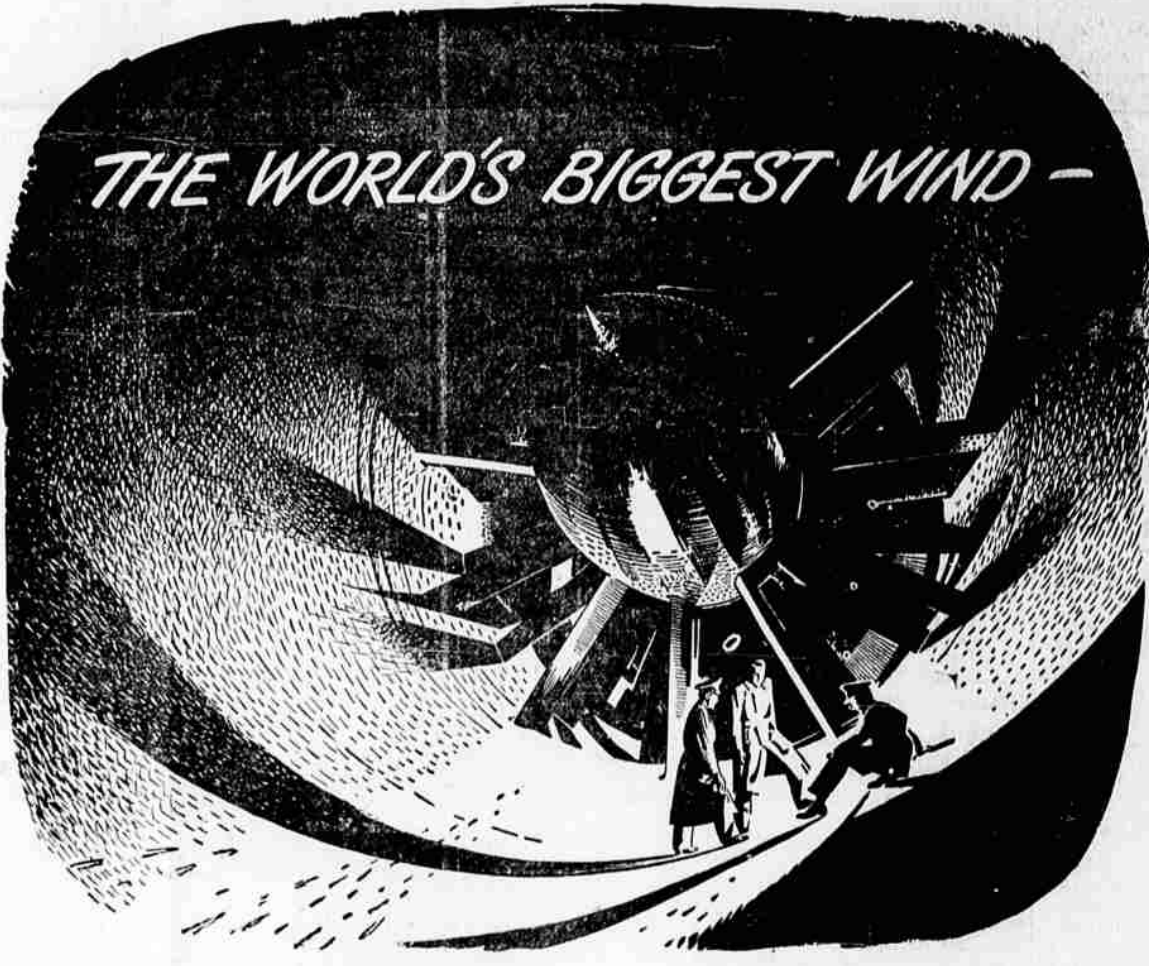
