Oil Suit Decree Eased to Permit Patent Licenses

WASHINGTON, April 8.—(AP)

The justice department announced today the filing of a supplemental judgment in an anti-trust suit under which Standard Oil company of New Jersey will make available to all persons at "a reasonable royalty rate" licenses for certain patents used in producing high octane aviation gasoline by a low-cost process which, it has been claimed, will revolutionize the automobile industry.

The supplemental action was taken before Judge William F. Smith in federal district court at Newark, N. J., where the original consent decree under which Standard was required to give unrestricted, royalty-free licenses during the war on synthetic rubber patents and some other patents was filed March 25, 1942.

Today's action, the department said, "is designed to clarify application of this decree to the catalytic refining patents by specifying that the compulsory licensing provisions of the decree applied to such patents, although a reasonable royalty may be charged."

Small refiners will be enabled to participate in the new low-cost process for aviation gasoline and other motor fuels, the department said, adding that the patents being made available also cover processes involved in the production of Butadiene, which is used in making synthetic rubber.
