## Camp Adair Soldier's Death Under Inquiry

CAMP ADAIR, Ore., April 10.—(AP)—Lieut. Col. Leo W. Belcher of Athens, Ga., finance officer for the Timber Wolf division here, died Thursday, first Lieut. George Godfrey, post public relations officer, announced today.

The cause of Belcher's death was withheld pending an investigation by a board of officers, Godfrey said.

Belcher, former auditor and assistant treasurer of the University of Georgia, held several finance posts in the army before his assignment here. He was engaged in the banking business in Athens from 1925-27.

Belcher is survived by his widow and two children in Athens.

## Saving of Crates, Produce Boxes Is Urged on Stores

Oregon growers of market vegetables in recent conferences joined with the industry generally and with government agencies in urging conservation of all boxes, crates and other kinds of fruit and vegetable containers this year.

"Because of the general shortage of fruit and vegetable containers, this committee recommends that there be continued an increasing salvage of all usable fruit and vegetable crates, containers, dealers, restaurants, hotels, grocers, and all others in position to assist in such salvaging," the growers stated in the conference report dealing with this subject. All used fruit and vegetable containers are valuable and are an aid to the war effort. None should be destroyed.

While no organized methods have yet been set up for collecting these containers from stores, restaurants and other places where they accumulate, it is recommended by the O. S. C. extension service that growers in each community contact their own business firms and arrange for the collection, sorting and distribution of these containers.

Both the excessive demand for lumber and the shortage of labor will make it extremely difficult for mills and box factories to supply box shooks in the required quantities this year. Every box saved and re-used will, therefore, serve a double purpose. Unless containers are salvaged there may be some crops left without any means of packing them for sending them to market.

## New Raspberry Will be Released

A new variety of raspberry named the Willamette is being released this spring from the small fruit breeding grounds at Oregon State college, where it was developed by George H. Waldo, federal horticulturist who conducts plant breeding work in cooperation with the Oregon experiment station.

This new hybrid, known through the years of its testing as Oregon No. 334, is the result of a cross between the Newburgh and Lloyd George varieties.

No plants are available from the experiment station, but some may be had from commercial nurserymen.

The new variety is more productive, larger, and has a firmer berry than the Cuthbert, which has long been the standard variety in this region. It has been tested thoroughly by the food industries department for canning and freezing, and found satisfactory. It is not quite as highly flavored as the Cuthbert, although it is of good quality. The canes are more hardy than the Cuthbert, and the plant is a vigorous grower.
