

Draft 'Breather' Likely for Fathers Physically O. K.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(AP)—The draft arithmetic provides an official tip to physically fit fathers:

If you're in the 18-37 age bracket, you will have a breathing spell—perhaps several months—to try to get lined up as irreplaceable in an essential activity.

But there won't be room for everyone there.

Present calculations, as outlined yesterday by Manpower Chief Paul W. McNutt, include a figure of 3,200,000 deferments covering both men who are rated essential and also "hardship" dependency cases.

That means approximately 11 out of every 14 physically fit men, 18 to 37 inclusive, are ticketed for the armed forces.

The commission's arithmetic indicates a situation so "tight" that some "essential" deferments may have to be cancelled in the long run, barring unforeseen developments.

Here's the arithmetic:

22,000,000 men in the 18-37 class.

Of these, the estimates figure 8,000,000 rejections as physically unfit. That leaves 14,000,000 physically fit men at those ages.

About half that number are in the service already.

The manpower commission says 1,500,000 will be deferred for farm work, figures 1,700,000 deferments for essentially and hardship—a total of 3,200,000 deferments for physically fit men.

Subtract that total from 14,000,000, and you have left: 10,800,000—the same approximate number the armed forces expect to have by the end of this year.

And that doesn't take into ac-

count the number of casualties who will have to be replaced.

Still, that isn't the whole picture, because it changes from day to day:

Every day some 3,000 boys reach the age of 18.

Too, every day a number of men—presumably a lesser number turn 38.

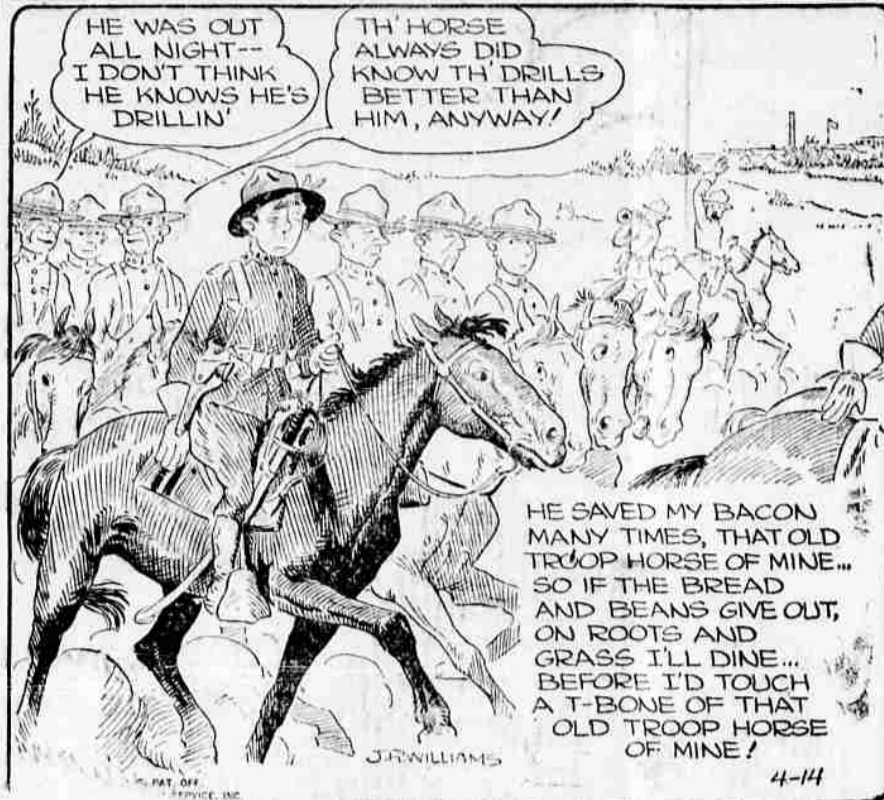
Noble Martian, who was principal in the Elkton high school has resigned and gone to La Grande.
