

Jefferson's Creed Cited By Roosevelt

Hostility to Tyranny Vow Recalled in Speech At Memorial Address

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(AP)—President Roosevelt, dedicating a marble temple to Thomas Jefferson, declared today that those fighting today's war would learn what Jefferson knew—that the "terrible eclipse of liberty" can well become the dawn of more liberty.

"Those who fight the tyranny of our time will come to learn that old lesson," the president said.

Surrounded by high officials, diplomats of many nations and many descendants of the author of the Declaration of Independence, the chief executive said in the dedication of the shrine to freedom that the nation is paying a debt "long overdue" the third president.

The words chosen for the memorial, he said, were Jefferson's noblest and carried the champion of freedom's most urgent meaning. These words are:

"I have sworn upon the altar of God eternal hostility against every form of tyranny over the mind of man."

Parallels Pointed Out

In his further remarks, the president said: "Jefferson faced the fact that men who will not fight for liberty can lose it. We, too, have faced that fact.

"He lived in a world in which freedom of conscience and freedom of mind were battles still to be fought through—not principles already accepted of all men. We, too, have lived in such a world.

"He loved peace and loved liberty—yet on more than one occasion he was forced to choose between them. We, too, have been compelled to make that choice.

"Generations which understand each other across the distances of history are the generations united by a common experience and a common cause. Jefferson, across one hundred and fifty years of life, is closer by much to living men than many of our leaders of the years between. His cause was a cause to which we also are committed, not by our words alone but by our sacrifice.

"For faith and ideals imply renunciations. Spiritual advancement throughout all our history has called for temporal sacrifices. "The Declaration of Independence and the very purposes of the revolution itself, while seeking freedoms, called for the abandonment of privileges.

Lead U. S. For 50 years "Jefferson was no dreamer—for half a century he led his states and his nation in fact and in deed. I like to think that this was so because he thought in terms of the morrow as well as the day—and this was why he was hated or feared by those who thought in terms of the day and the yesterday.

"We judge him by the application of his philosophy to the circumstances of his life time. But in such applying we come to understand that his life was given for those deeper values which persist throughout all time.

"Leader in the philosophy of government, in education, in the arts, in efforts to lighten the toil of mankind—exponent of planning for the future, he led the steps of America into the path of the permanent integrity of the republic.

"Thomas Jefferson believed, as we believe, in man. He believed, as we believe, that men are capable of their own government and that no king, no tyrant, no dictator can govern for them as wisely as they can govern for themselves.

"He believed, as we believe, in certain inalienable rights. He, as we, saw those principles and freedoms unchallenged. He fought for them, as we fight for them.

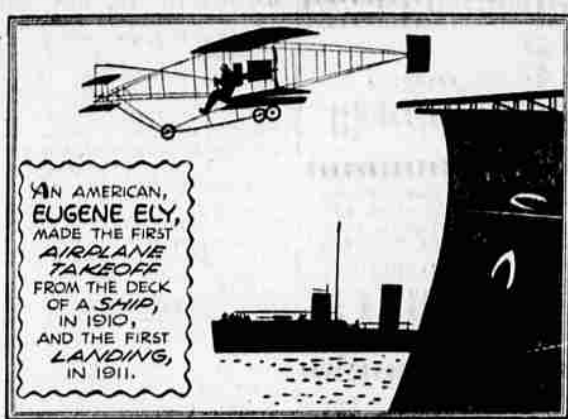
"He proved that the seeming eclipse of liberty can well become the dawn of more liberty. Those who fight the tyranny of our own time will come to learn that old lesson. Among all the peoples of the earth, the cruelties and oppressions of its would-be masters have taught that generation what its liberties can mean. This lesson, so bitterly learned, will never be forgotten while this generation lives."

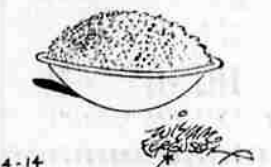

Omaha's Airport Doomed by Flood Of Missouri River

OMAHA, April 13.—(AP)—Army engineers today abandoned hope of saving Omaha's \$4,000,000 airport and Carter Lake, Ia., from inundation by Missouri river flood waters as the angry stream poured through two broken dikes into the 10-square-mile stricken area on the north-eastern outskirts of Omaha.

At Hamburg, Ia., 50 miles south, 200 families living in the southern portion of the community, which is 11 feet below the normal river level, began leaving their homes after dikes at McPaul and Perival, above Hamburg, gave way. Residents of McPaul also were ordered to leave their homes.

Col. Lewis Pick, U. S. army division engineer, said there was no chance of stopping the Omaha dike break and that further efforts to save the airport and Carter Lake area would not be made.

The river reached its crest at 2 a. m. at 22.45 feet, remaining at that level until 7 a. m. It then started receding slowly at the rate of about one-tenth of a foot an hour.

From four to six feet of water

was expected to cover the airport within the next 48 hours. Two thirds of the field stood in several feet of water this morning, said Airport Manager William R. Milner.

From two directions through widening gaps in the broken dikes, the swollen river spilled into the airport and Carter lake.

Link in Camp Comfort Road Will Be Closed

The South Umpqua road to Camp Comfort will not be open above the Andraieff place this weekend, V. V. Harpham, forest supervisor, reported today. This leaves a six-mile hike by road for persons planning to go to Fish Lake. It is expected, it was stated, to reopen the road to traffic within a week or ten days, following completion of repairs now being made.

Socks and rayon hose deserve washing care

Rayon hose and socks don't really belong in the regular wash... that is if they are to give long wear. And long wear in anything is very important these days. It takes but a moment to wash them out in a mild, lukewarm suds every evening, and you'll find they last much longer when given this immediate dosing.

TO WASH RAYON HOSE—Turn them wrong side out and shake them. Be sure the water is no more than lukewarm, then add a mild granulated soap and agitate it with your hand into a foamy suds. Squeeze the hose through this suds for several minutes, then press out the water and rinse in at least two waters of the same lukewarm temperature. Squeeze by hand or roll up in towel and press out the final rinse water. Shake the hose out. NEVER TWIST OR WHIRL RAYON when it is wet, because rayon is at its weakest then, and twisting or wringing might cause the yarns to break.

Hang hose over a smooth surface in the shade and away from artificial heat, pulling them into shape gently, and easing them slightly so that they will be form-fitting when dry. Allow at least 48 hours for rayon hose to dry, and never put them on until they are completely dry.

TO WASH SOCKS—Turn them inside out, shake them, and wash after your stockings in the same mild warm suds. Mild soap and tepid water are a protection for the color and yarns. Only very soiled work socks can stand rougher treatment. Squeeze the socks through for several minutes, then squeeze out the water, and rinse twice. Hang them separately to dry, and avoid sunshine for colored socks.
