the less dangerous.

A FORMAL statement issued
following the Hitler-Mussolini
meeting says the big shot and his
satellite little shot have dedi-
cated themselves and their people to
"complete annihilation of any
future danger which might
threaten the European-African
area from the west or from the
east."

Don't pay much attention to
the statements issued after these
conferences. What is given out is
for the ENEMY'S consumption—
as was our unconditional surren-
der ultimatum at Casablanca.

The conferences aren't tipping
off anything that would be really
interesting or valuable to their
enemies.

YOU never heard of a football
coach tipping off any of the
really hot, inside stuff he plans
to use against his opponent in the
big game.

A N Italian newspaper (La Tribu-
na Illustrata) is quoted by the
Berlin radio as saying that
Hitler and his stooge, Mussolini,
are deciding "whether or when"
New York is to be bombed.

La Tribuna Illustrata says the
new Heinkel-177 could easily do
it, carrying from two to three
tons of bombs from bases on the
French coast and depending for
weather information on axis sub-
marines scattered across the At-
lantic.

THAT is probably true enough.
The question is whether they
WILL do it.

We could bomb Tokyo again.
The Japs could bomb our Pacific
coast cities. No one has any very
definite doubts as to that.

Bombing New York would take
a lot of effort and energy away
from what Hitler (and Mussolini)
are really interested in right now
for what after all would be only
a stunt that would make us sev-
eral times madder than we al-
ready are.

NOTE these stories that are
coming out of the South seas
about GROWING Jap air
strength.

They're probably true. We're
at least hearing a lot more about
big Jap air fleets.

They're also intended (we may
be reasonably sure) as pressure
on Washington to get more
planes into the South seas.

IT'S a pity the news all has to be
INTERPRETED as to its real
meaning, but that's the way it is.
That's always the way it is when
censorship interrupts the FREE
FLOW of the news. And in modern
war censorship seems to be
unavoidably necessary.

AND don't forget that the big
A bond drive to provide financial
aids for our war effort gets
under way this week.

Keep this thought always in
your mind: If the bonds of the
United States of America aren't
good, NOTHING WILL BE ANY
GOOD.

So put all your loose cash into
them as unhesitatingly as our
boys on the fighting fronts put
their LIVES into their job.

JAPS BEATEN IN AFRICA

EDITORIAL

It is a long distance from Tunis to Tokyo and it may seem that
the defeat of Rommel in North Africa is of little consequence
in the South Pacific arena. But success against Rommel is as
great a disaster to the Japanese as it is to Germany, and, in fact,
may, in the final outcome, prove of greater influence in the
achievement of victory in the South Pacific than in Europe.

Germany has at her command, as a result of her conquests,
industrial resources capable of matching the United Nations in
production. In addition to her own extensive armament plants,
she holds all of the factories of France, the low countries and
the exceptionally great Skoda works of Czechoslovakia. Given
the necessary raw materials, the enforced labor, oil and other
requirements to fully utilize these great resources, Germany's
production would become a factor the United Nations would
be pressed to excel.

Japan, on the other hand, has very limited production facili-
ties, plus the fact that her armament plants are centralized and
susceptible to bombing. She has, however, by her seizure of
territory gained the world's greatest reservoir of raw materials
needed for war purposes.

The strategy revealed by axis movements and undoubtedly a
part of the German-Japanese pact, indicates a cooperative
agreement in which Japan was to furnish the raw materials
needed by Germany, while Germany, in return, would supply
Japan with the munitions and equipment needed to consolidate
her gains and expand her conquests.

The plan looked easy on paper and, in fact, did not fall far
short of attainment.

It called for Germany to quickly dispose of Russia, obtaining
use of the Trans-Siberian railway, while Japan conquered the
islands of the South Pacific. Germany also would seize North
Africa and the Suez canal, thus gaining control of the Mediter-
ranean sea. Germany and Japan would then combine to force
a meeting in India, establishing two transportation routes be-
tween the two aggressor nations.

From the Dutch East Indies, Malaya, Burma and India, Ja-
pan would then be able to supply Hitler with all the raw
materials needed to feed his vast industrial empire, using the
short Mediterranean route for transportation. Hitler, in return,
would be able to ship by rail the tanks, planes, guns and ammu-
nition needed by Japan.

Success of the plan depended upon the diversion of the
United States' armed might into the South Pacific but Uncle
Sam failed to be drawn into the trap, even though angered by
the sneak attack of the wily Japs.

Despite the great protest of the uninformed public that more
aggressive action be taken in the Pacific, the United States has
centered its strength in North Africa and through its produc-
tive resources has been of immense aid in the Russian victories.
Thus the axis plan has been frustrated. Hitler's war indus-
tries have been slowed down by lack of materials and are grad-
ually being destroyed by terrific aerial bombardment.

Japan, despite access to the vital materials of war, lacks facili-
ties to manufacture the machines, implements and munitions
she needs to continue the war at the pace necessary to complete
her program of conquest, before allied might can be brought
against her.

Thus the destruction of German ambitions in North Africa
is a solar plexus blow to Japan and the victory is as important
to the South Pacific as it had been won in that arena.

Tin Can Gather, Shipping Plans Made in Roseburg

Fred A. Goff, Douglas county salvage committee chairman, announces that final plans have been made now for gathering and shipping the tin cans from Roseburg and Douglas county. E. T. Unrath of the Coca Cola Bottling company, and Albert Micelli, of the Pepsi-Cola Bottling company, cooperating with the local schools, have been gathering the cans at the school buildings each Friday and taking them to their places of business for storage. As their storage facilities were becoming badly crowded, Churchill Hardware company donated the use of their warehouse on the railroad spur to the bottling companies to store the cans until such time as sufficient quantity has been collected for car lot shipment. Every one who has been saving cans is now urged to take them to their nearest school early Friday so they can be gathered from the schools by the beverage distributors who are donating their time, trucks and efforts in moving this valuable material to the war plants for detinning.

Individuals and communities outside of Roseburg are urged to get in touch with the local salvage chairman at once for disposal of the cans that have been saved.

"Be sure that your cans are properly prepared, that is, cleaned, dried, tops and bottoms removed and placed inside of the cans and the cans pressed flat

and packed in proper cartons or bag for easy transportation," Chairman Goff said. "Everyone working in this program is donating all of their time and trucks and we know that the full cooperation of everyone is being given. We must complete this shipment on or before May 25."

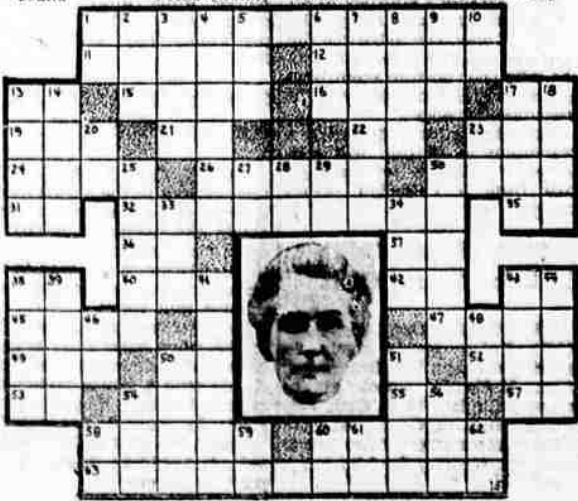

2nd Hand Truck Buying Requires Check With ODT

Persons planning to purchase second-hand trucks were told today to check with the office of defense transportation if they wanted to be sure they could use the trucks after getting them.

Marshall E. Nauman, district manager of ODT's division of motor transportation, reports that some people have purchased light trucks in place of passenger cars, believing they could obtain gasoline rations for personal use.

Nauman declared that trucks of any size can be used only to perform essential transportation service in the war effort or in the civilian economy and that gasoline and mileage can only be certified for these uses.

Nauman also emphasized that certificates of war necessity and "T" ration gasoline coupons may not be transferred along with titles to trucks or other commercial vehicles.

New operators receiving a motor vehicle through transfer must file an application for a certificate with their nearest ODT office, immediately upon the completion of the transfer.

The operator selling the equipment must return the certificate to the ODT district office and surrender unused "T" coupons to their local war price and rationing boards upon completion of the transfer.

Nauman stated that prospective truck buyers located within eleven counties of the Medford District should contact the ODT office located at Medford, Oregon.
