PORTLAND, April 14.—(AP)—A shoe salesman shot and seriously wounded was charged with attempted larceny of an automobile as he lay in a hospital here today.

The wounded man is John L. Gordon. John Dow, former Portland policeman on leave from an air corps assignment, said he fired two shots at Gordon in the belief that he was attempting to steal his automobile. One bullet struck the man in the shoulder and ploughed through his chest.

Cease Borrowing Gas Coupons, Truck Operators Told

The practice of borrowing transport ration gasoline coupons by truck operators must be stopped.

This warning is issued by Marshall E. Nauman, district manager of the office of defense transportation, when he said this misuse of gasoline coupons had been on the increase in the southern Oregon district area.

He declared that ODT was making a careful check of mileage traveled against actual gasoline consumed by operators and that those who have had excess gasoline allotted them will be reissued certificates of war necessity providing less fuel and mileage.

Meanwhile, Nauman told truck operators that unused first quarter "T" gasoline coupons which are no longer valid must be turned in at once with the coupon book to the local war price rationing boards. If all coupons were used, the book cover nevertheless must be turned in.

Unused coupons and books, he explained, were no longer valid after April 1 and operators were required to turn them in by April 5.

OPA officials said that local war price and rationing boards are now checking their records on truck operators who have first quarter "T" books outstanding.

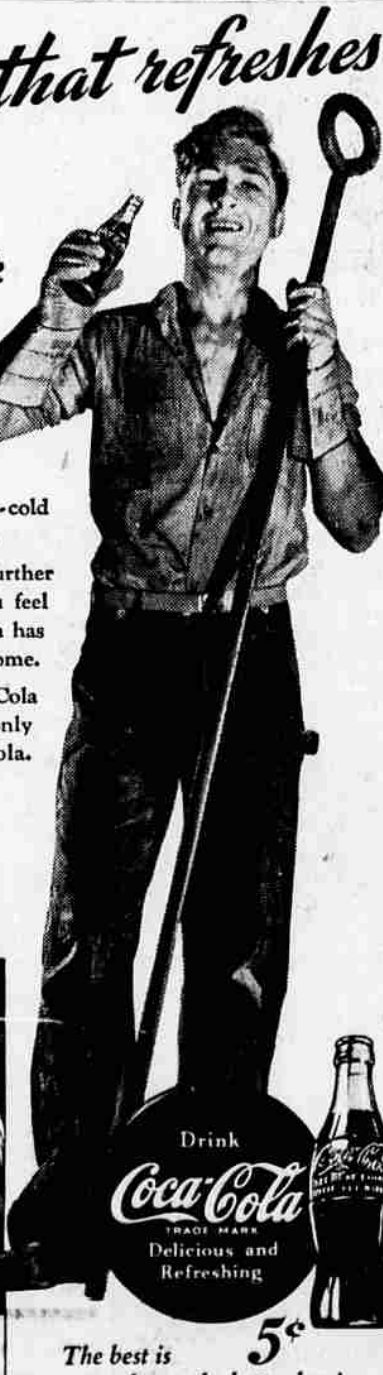
