EVELYN WILEY REPORTS TO NAVAL AIR STATION AT LAKEHURST, N. J.

U. S. NAVAL AIR STATION Lakehurst, New Jersey.—Evelyn Greer Wiley, seaman second class in the WAVES, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Wiley, 809 South Kane St., Roseburg, Ore., a parachute packer before enlisting, has reported to the naval air station at Lakehurst, New Jersey, navy's famous lighter-than-air base, for training in the Parachute Material Service school.

After 16 weeks of training, successful students receive the rating of parachute rigger, third class and are transferred to active duty in the aviation branch of naval service.

The school trains WAVES, sailors, marines, and coast guardsmen in the intricacies of a parachute, and teaches them how to rig and repair chutes. Each student manufactures in the tool rooms the tools with which he or she works during training, and in the sewing room learns how to use and repair various machines utilized in repairing parachutes. Methods employed in maintenance of aviation life-saving equipment and flight clothing also are taught.

A requisite for graduation is that each student must have packed at least 100 chutes during the training period. Bluejackets, marines, and coast guardsmen make two jumps from a stationary blimp, using chutes they have packed themselves, before being graduated. While WAVES are not required to make the leaps they are taught the art of jumping and its problems through classroom lectures.
