Recruiters For WAACs Date Visit to Roseburg

The enrollment of women in the WAACs and 17 to 26 year-old men for the aviation cadet program will be the dual purpose of the visit of an army traveling board to Roseburg, April 27-28.

The group from the Portland headquarters will be equipped to complete the WAAC enlistments without the necessity of applicants traveling to Portland, according to Colonel J. J. Fulmer, commanding officer of the Oregon recruiting and induction district.

In the case of the air corps applicants, they will be given the air corps mental screening examination, a preliminary physical examination and arrangements completed for their regular air corps physical at Portland for those in the 17-year-old group. Those in the 18 to 26 year group will be given screening tests and referred to their local selective service boards.

Members of the traveling board are Lt. D. C. Dods, medical examiner; Lt. Rosemary Murray, WAAC officer; Sgt. D. C. Prouty, aviation cadet board clerk; and Auxiliary E. F. Darling, WAAC recruiter.

The Fieldman's Nightmare Season

About this time of year and for the next three months, all you folks brooding chicks and poulters have your worries and troubles. If it isn't troubles, it's worrying about when troubles might or will come. You are likely to have coxey, parasites, mycosis, toe picks, cannibalism and a host of other troubles.

But each of you has only his own flock to worry about. The fieldman has worry and all your neighbors and friends besides. He is supposed to know everything, and be able to tell you from a very vague description just what caused that chick to die last week, or what might have been wrong with the poult that drooped around a day or so, then recovered. Of course, you tied a string around his leg, but he lost it off, and now you can't find him.

Unfortunately, the fieldman has been in this business only about thirty years, so he admits he doesn't know all the answers. Then, (in some cases), you try some other fieldman, who admits he knows just about everything. Then, we worry because you had to do this, and wish we could be wiser. That causes indigestion, and more nightmares.

But, do you know, nearly all of our troubles are caused by something you did, or failed to do right at home? Cannibalism, for instance, is nearly always brought on by overcrowding, overheating, and lack of sufficient ventilation.

Get the babies out doors, keep the house as cool as you can without chilling them, and keep the windows open.

Manpower Shortage? No!

If there is really a shortage of manpower, as Mr. McNutt says, he should go over and talk to the gentleman at the head of the OPA. According to our computation, (even though we have to take off our shoes when we try to count over ten), it takes 2,156,438 extra "man-hours" every Saturday night for people to get their stamps counted for the Sunday groceries and meats. Pullorum

There is one notable exception to the rule that most of your troubles are due to your own management. That is PULLORUM. Here are a few points on pullorum we wish to stress:

- 1—Pullorum is extremely serious and costly to everyone.
- 2—Pullorum is incurable, and highly fatal.
- 3—Pullorum is preventable.
- 4—Pullorum is spread through carelessness—or worse.
- 5—Pullorum is far too prevalent in Douglas county this year.
- 6—Pullorum is inherited from infected hens.

Somebody is delivering eggs to hatcheries from hens that are infected with pullorum, and the resulting loss to poultrymen is terrific, sometimes amounting to 80 or 90% of the entire flock. Pullorum spreads in the hatchery from these few infected chicks to all the chicks that hatch in the same compartment, so that many chicks from clean flocks contract the disease, and die by the dozen.

We ask that everyone selling eggs, or taking eggs to hatcheries for custom hatching make certain that their eggs are not going to affect some innocent flock owner's chicks. Such a practice really constitutes a crime, which we hope will not go unpunished. There are several different ways this might happen. Be certain that you can honestly say: "My hands are clean."
