Duke of Connaught Dies Suddenly in Canada

OTTAWA, April 26.—(AP)—The duke of Connaught, 28, died suddenly today at Government House where he had been a guest for several months.

A great grandson of Queen Victoria, he became the duke of Connaught on the death of his grandfather, a son of Queen Victoria, on Jan. 16, 1942. His father, Prince Arthur of Connaught, died in 1938.

The duke was unmarried and the title lapsed with his death. His grandfather, the first duke, was governor general of Canada during world war I.

The second duke came to Canada after two years' service with the British army in Egypt.

Secret Feed Formulas
In trying to sell goods, some salesmen resort to a sort of "whispering campaign," telling us very confidentially that THEIR product has some mysterious secret ingredient that nobody else ever heard about, and which makes THEIR product greatly superior to any similar product on the market. You can hear it over the radio, see it in the newspapers and salesmen who have resorted to magazines, and hear it direct from the men trying to sell. We have even known of feed these tactics. There is a price-less ingredient that should go into every sack of feed, or every other manufactured product. That priceless ingredient is the integrity and honesty of the manufacturer. The manufacturers of Umpqua and Sunrise poultry and dairy feeds have never claimed any secret ingredient. But we do admit that we put this priceless ingredient into all our products. Aside from this one ingredient, our formulas are open to the public, whether they be customers, prospective customers, or competitors. This policy, and the fact that our mixing machinery is open to public inspection at all times, is largely responsible for our growth from a small "shovel mixer" to our present status as one of the largest and most modern home-owned home-operated feed manufacturers in the Northwest. We never believed in secrets anyway, because after you and I and one other know it, it is no longer a secret. Besides, it isn't any fun having a secret and keeping it to yourself.

Higher Feed: Cheaper Eggs
OPA has raised the ceiling price on Lacto G \$40.00 per ton in one jump. This was done to stimulate production of more cheese for our fighting men. Lacto G, (dried whey) is a by-product of cheese making, and is about the only form of animal protein left available in any quantity for poultry feeds. Therefore, a \$40.00 per ton jump means an extra dime for every sack of feed where Lacto G is used. Just what OPA has done or will do about the price of eggs and chickens, we can't tell you now. But when it comes to prophesying OPA, we give up.

Pullorum Still in Evidence
We had hoped by this week that we could say this terrible disease had been cleaned out. Unfortunately, we can't. We hope everybody who is selling hatching eggs, or taking them in for custom hatching will check carefully. Has your flock been tested recently? Have you put in any birds from an untested flock recently? Are you taking any of your neighbors eggs? Do you know anybody who is selling hatching eggs, and shouldn't? If so, do you think it is right?

A Chance for Economy
Without our telling you, you know corn is pretty steep in price. We have some beautiful Hanchen Barley which will cost you \$5.00 a ton less than corn. Experiments have demonstrated that Barley is practically identical in feed value with corn. This barley is clean and white, and weighs 50 lbs. and will make you a neat saving. A two bit war stamp saved on every sack.

Cafeteria Feeding
For years we have been trying to get poultrymen to feed more scratch grain to laying hens. The common theory that "more mash makes more eggs" has been disproved time and again. Laying hens need a balanced ration, which means both grain and mash aplenty. In these days of rationing and shortages, it is even more imperative to conserve protein feeds. When you can do this, and get better results at the same time—well, what are we waiting for? A very satisfactory way to feed grains is the "cafeteria" system, in which both grain and mash are kept before the birds at all times, making certain that hoppers are cleaned once a day. This system is being used on many farms in Douglas county, and the results in egg production, lower mortality and better health are very gratifying.
