Dr. Baird Named Dean of Medical School at U. of O.

EUGENE, Ore., April 27.—(AP)—Dr. David W. E. Baird, acting dean of the University of Oregon Medical school in Portland since 1941, was named dean of the institution today by the state board of higher education. He replaces Dr. H. B. Dillehunt, dean of the school since 1920, who is resigning because of ill health.

Dr. Dillehunt, who has served the medical school for 32 years, will become dean emeritus on June 30, when his resignation will become effective.

Dr. Baird, 44, a native of Baker, will receive a salary of \$7,000 per year, with the usual privileges accorded administrative officials in regard to private practice not interfering with their duties.

The new dean completed his pre-medical course at the University of Oregon in 1921. And graduated from the University Medical school in 1926. He served his internship at Multnomah hospital, and was named an assistant professor of medicine at the medical school in 1932. He became associate dean in 1937.

He is a specialist in internal medicine.

Training at War Solves England's Juvenile Problem

SEATTLE, April 27.—(AP)—England is solving its wartime juvenile delinquency problem by putting the youngsters into uniforms and giving them military-patterned outlets for their energies, Basil Henriques, British welfare authority, said yesterday in a Post-Intelligencer interview.

Here to address the Washington state convention of social workers, he said:

"The boys aren't bad at heart, but they didn't have an outlet for their natural energies. They are full of the spitfire spirit; they want to be just as daring as their brothers and fathers in the armed forces.

"We provide them with outlets, however, when we put them in uniform and give them real war training. Many of the boys, after working all day, are turning out for the cadet corps five nights a week and again on Sunday morning. All of them want certificates they can show when they are drafted."

Rubber-Gas Feud Rapped by Nelson

WASHINGTON, April 27.—(AP)—Sharply critical of public-ally aimed "fighting" between government officials, WPB Chairman Donald M. Nelson testified today he believes that not only the synthetic rubber and high octane gasoline programs can be carried out this year, but also the planned production of airplanes, escort vessels and merchant shipping.

Called before the Truman committee inquiring into a dispute involving Rubber Director Jeffers, Undersecretary of War Patterson and Petroleum Administrator Ickes, Nelson said:

"Everything that can be done to expedite construction of plants for manufacture of high octane gasoline will be done," adding:

"This can be done through cooperation, not through fighting."

Without mentioning either Patterson or Jeffers by name, the War Production board chairman declared:

"Any indulgence in personal rivalries in time of war is completely out of place."

Bus Passenger Dies of Heart Attack Here

George Enoch Moore, 55, a resident of Los Angeles, died suddenly Monday night at the local Greyhound depot, while en route to his home, following a visit with relatives in Salem. Coronor H. C. Stearns reported death to be due to a heart ailment.

Mr. Moore was apparently in normal health upon arrival of the stage in Roseburg, and had left the bus for exercise. He was seized by the heart attack after he had returned to his seat. He was removed to the depot and a physician was called, but he had apparently died almost immediately. The body was removed to the Douglas Funeral home, where it is being held while awaiting instructions from relatives.

U. S. Air Power in North Stirs Japs

(By the Associated Press)
The Japanese radio reported today a strong concentration of United States bomber and fighter squadrons in Alaska and the Aleutian islands, which point like stopping stones toward Tokyo.

The broadcast, heard by the Associated Press, quoted the correspondent of the newspaper Asahi as saying:

"The Japanese should not take American boasts about coming air attacks too lightly, but should prepare mentally and materially to frustrate these American attempts."

The report said the Americans were "feverishly establishing large airfields" on all the Aleutian islands large enough to accommodate hangars, runways, planes and munition dumps. The largest base was said to be on Kodiak island where three squadrons were established.

The Japanese reports had no confirmation from any other source.

Prison Terms Faced by Tombstone Destroyers

VANCOUVER, Wash., April 27.—(AP)—Vandals who upset a score of tombstones at the military cemetery near Vancouver barracks face federal prison sentences, Col. Jere Baxter, post commander, said today.

The depredations were discovered last night. Some of the stones were smashed.

Cinnabar Prospect Will be Explored

Formation of a local company which will conduct exploration of a cinnabar prospect on the A. V. Abene property, eight miles east of Sutherlin, is nearing completion here is was announced today by E. M. Renfro. Mr. Renfro has secured an agreement with the property owner to conduct the exploration, which will be in charge of W. F. Kernin, local driller.

The property is located one mile southwest of the Bonanza mine, which, until recently, was the largest quicksilver mine in the United States and was one of the principal producers of the metal so vitally needed in war production.

The Abene property, Mr. Renfro states, indicates a large deposit of cinnabar ore. It is planned to make a thorough exploration to determine the size and quality of the deposit, and, if findings warrant, a pilot plant will be installed preliminary to large scale production.

Oregon Taxes to Drop in Returns Next Year

SALEM, Ore., April 27.—(AP)—Oregon income taxpayers will get at least a 50 per cent reduction on taxes on this year's income which are payable next year, State Tax Commissioner Earl L. Fisher estimated today.

Fisher based his prediction on collections this year, which are far higher than any previous year. The commission has collected \$12,100,000 in personal and corporation income taxes, compared with \$8,200,000 on the same date a year ago. Fisher predicted that total collections for the year would be between \$18,000,000 and \$21,000,000, compared with \$13,800,000 for all of last year.

The 1943 legislature's formula for next year's income tax reduction is based on collections this year and next year's estimated collections.
