Records Set in Prices Paid Sea Fishermen

SEATTLE, April 27.—(AP)—Net profits are high this year for the men who toil on the fishing banks off the Pacific northwest coast.

Crew members of the halibut schooner Brisk collected approximately \$1,000 apiece for four days of fishing as their cargo of 41,000 pounds sold for nearly \$15,000. It was reported at the fishermen's exchange as a new record for a halibut boat's first trip of the season.

A 1,000 pound salmon cargo was sold on the exchange for 511 cents a pound, a new all-time high salmon price peak. It was trucked from the coastal community of Westport, Wash. The previous high of 48 cents was paid last week.

The shortage of fish because of unfavorable conditions on the fish banks, rather than the coincidental shortage of meats, is the cause of soaring prices, fishing industry leaders say. Sliced fresh salmon has been retailing here recently for 60 to 70 cents a pound.

Pacific Wool Growers Announce Sale of Pool

PORTLAND, April 28.—(AP)—The Pacific Wool Growers association said today that checks were in the mail for sale of the valley pool, totaling nearly 800,000 pounds of wool.

The pool was organized by growers of western Oregon and Washington. Approximately 1200 member shippers will receive checks, the association said.

More than half the pool sold at 48 cents, choice wool at 50 cents and lamb wool down to 41 cents, the association said.

Salvation Army Drive Meets Half of Budget

Williston is president of the Oregon Mining association, a member of the quicksilver advisory committee of the Federal War Production board, and consultant for the Board of Economic Warfare.

When that flaming evangelist of Florence, Italy, Savonarola The Monk, stirred mighty throngs to live pure Christian lives, especially was his work effective among the children. Thousands of them marched the streets of the city singing "Christ is King, Christ is King." This very much displeased the leaders of the church and state, and a conspiracy was conjured against the "Monk of Florence," which finally resulted in burning him at the stake. For more than a century, on the anniversary of his death, this area was strewn with violets in memory of the good which Savonarola had achieved and in atonement for his martyrdom. In searching for the secret of his greatness and power, they found on the wall of his cell, a large Roman cross, on the right were the letters, L. U. and on the left were the letters L. E. and with the cross spelled Lex, meaning Christ is my law. At the foot of the cross were the letters P. A. and with the cross spelled Pax, meaning Christ is my peace. At the top of the cross were the letters R. E. and with the cross spelled Rex, meaning Christ is my king. Here said they is the secret of his greatness and power. Christ is my light, Christ is my law, Christ is my peace, Christ is my king, Amen.

Food Czar Lauds Spirit of Farmers

NEW YORK, April 28.—(AP)—War Food Administrator Chester C. Davis, declaring farmers are doing spring planting in the American spirit of "damn the torpedoes; go ahead," expressed hope today this year's food output would top last year's record.

In a speech at a meeting of the United States Chamber of Commerce, Davis said farmers are "taking a patriotic chance for America" by planting every possible acre although faced with shortage of labor and machinery.

Davis outlined difficulties confronting farmers, but said steps being taken by the government to recruit harvest hands, together with changes in selective service regulations relating to deferment of farm workers, make the manpower outlook brighter than it was a few months ago. He promised also that the farm machinery situation would improve.

"If we get average weather or better," he said, "we should top the 1942 production figure which was an all-time high, and we'll have the largest supply in our history to divide up among the various claimants."

The food chief emphasized, however, that production, no matter how good it may be, would not be sufficient to satisfy the "biggest demand we've ever had in this country."

First Co-Ed Elected as Student Body President

EUGENE, Ore., April 28.—(AP)—For the first time in the history of the University of Oregon a co-ed has been elected to the position of student body president. She is Nancy Ames, Portland, who beat out Oge Young, Portland, 764 votes to 712 for the top spot in ASUO elections yesterday.

The elections were almost exclusively a women's affair with Young the only male student capturing an office. Under the preferential system of voting, he was awarded the first vice-presidency.

Lumber Workers Obey Back-to-Woods Order

PORTLAND, Ore., April 28.—(AP)—Employment office figures showed today that the Pacific northwest's lumber workers are responding to the War Manpower commission's back-to-the-woods order.

Emory Worth, director of the Federal Employment service in Oregon, said several hundred returned to the woods from other war jobs.
