BRITISH bombers hit Duisburg, 12 miles west of Essen, in the Ruhr valley of Germany.

The Duisburg raid is aimed at munitions works. At Bari, we're pounding axis communications with Africa.

THE Germans didn't do so well in their Kuban offensive in the Caucasus.

They had concentrated heavy air strength in the Crimea, at the Kerch strait and on the Taman peninsula just across the strait.

The red air force hit these German air concentrations so hard and so quickly that hundreds of Nazi planes (the Russians claim) were destroyed on the ground and in the air.

A WAR map just published in Hitler's newspaper substantially confirms the map recently printed by the Russians, indicating that Russian gains in their winter offensive were even greater than we had known.

LONDON, incidentally, is said to be "shocked" by the Russians' ruckus with the Poles.

This writer, personally, isn't too deeply shocked. If Russia, at immense cost in blood, goes ahead and destroys German military might, she'll be fairly entitled to try her hand at fixing things up in Europe.

She couldn't possibly do a much worse job than has been done in the past.

THE U. S. Board of Economic Warfare estimates that German looting of conquered Europe had reached a total of 36 billion dollars by the end of 1941 and has been proceeding since at the rate of "tens of billions" yearly.

MACARTHUR announces that his troops now command the hills overlooking Mubo, 12 miles south of the Jap base at Salamaua, in New Guinea.

We're still fighting, you see, in the South Pacific. The news from there has been overshadowed in recent days by Tunisia.

NAVY Secretary Knox tells his press conference in Washington that the Japs "might" use their Aleutian positions to raid the U. S. west coast, but he thinks the possibility of such an operation is remote.

Still, we'll be safer if we go on the theory that it MIGHT come, so let's BE READY for it.

SAFEGUARDING OUR FREEDOM

EDITORIAL

NEWSPAPER readers and radio fans may be wondering why the press and radio are creating such a fuss concerning the order barring reporters from the international conference on food to be held at Hot Springs, May 18.

The fact is there is one constitutional right—the right of free speech, involving the freedom of the press—that is most jealously guarded by the newspapers of this nation.

Efforts have been made by administration officials to impose a similar licensing system upon newspapers. These attempts have been beaten off by a press united in its determination to maintain freedom of utterance.

Newspapers and radio stations are willing to cooperate in the withholding of news which might be of value to the enemy. The voluntary censorship imposed by newspapers and the radio upon themselves has been amply demonstrated in the several recent trips by the president of the United States, and in numerous other events which would have been of exceptional interest to the readers and listeners.

If newspapers and radio stations on the other hand acquiesce in the order barring attendance at the Hot Springs conference, or if they "soft-pedal" bureaucratic fumbling, muddling and quarreling dangerous precedents would be established which would seriously endanger the future liberty of the peoples of this nation.

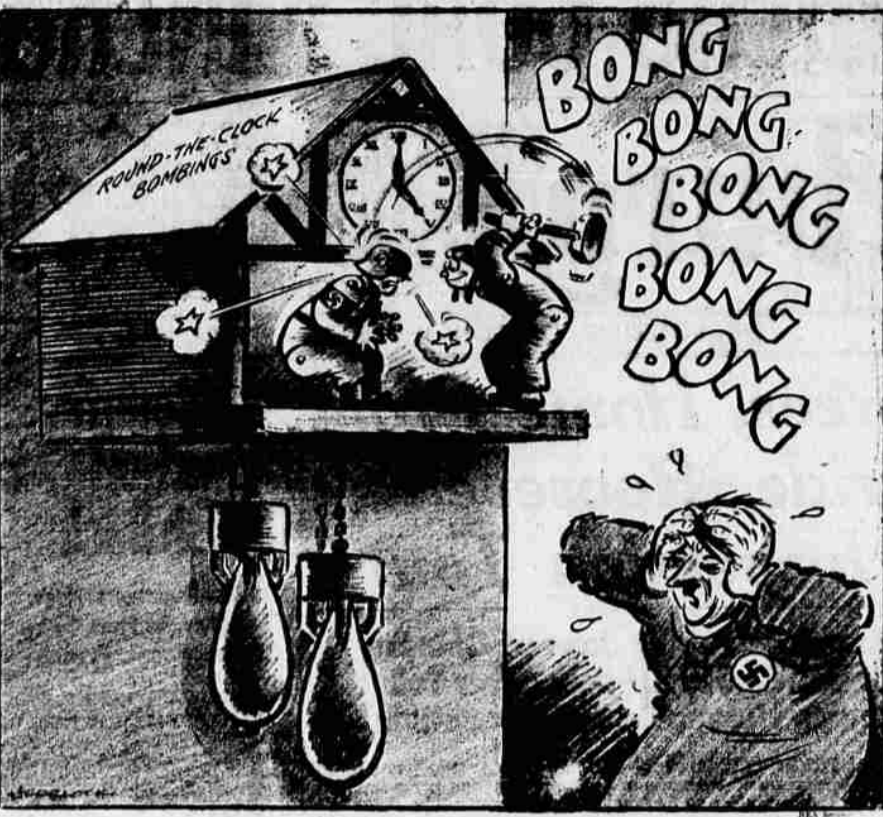
It is peculiar that a government which has proclaimed freedom of speech as one of the "Four Freedoms" for which this country is fighting today would sanction the barring of the press from the forthcoming conference.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 26.—Once again the principal topic of conversation around the House of Representatives is a pay-as-you-go tax plan.

There has been so much careless use of the term "forgiveness" of taxation that I want to take just a minute on that subject.

SEATTLE, April 29.—(AP)—Pacific northwest homes and apartment houses will be supplied with a "fuel oil bank with a 'no touch' sign on it" under a liberalized program of delivery allowance announced yesterday by the OPA.

Fuel Oil Assured Northwest Users

Henry B. Owen, assistant regional OPA administrator, said the "fill 'er up" program would begin May 15 in Washington, Oregon and 20 Idaho counties.

The liberalization is in no way a modification of rationing rules on consumption, he said.

Owen explained that rationing boards would send residence and apartment fuel oil users from 40 to 45 per cent of their full year's oil ration coupons.

"Thus, if we are cut off from our fuel oil supply, as we have been told might happen by high military authorities, we will still have the oil stored in 235,000 northwest homes," Owen asserted.

The revision applies only to users of more than 150 gallons of fuel oil a year. Owen said the consumer would not be required to take any action until after he receives the ration coupons from his board.
