RECEIVES FATHER'S MEDAL—George F. Marshall, Jr., three years old, of Jacksonville, Florida, stood beside his mother at the War Department in Washington while Brigadier General John T. Lewis, Commanding General of the Washington Military District, by direction of the Secretary of War fastened a Distinguished Service Cross on his coat over his heart. The Cross had been awarded posthumously to the little boy's father, Lieutenant Colonel George F. Marshall, Armored Force, the first officer of the United States Army to be killed in action in the operations in North Africa. Colonel Marshall's death occurred on November 8, 1942, while directing the landing of troops at Oran under heavy enemy fire.

Eugene Lashed by Cloudburst, Hailstorm

EUGENE, Ore., April 29.—(AP)—Capricious April dumped her bag of weather tricks on Eugene last Tuesday afternoon with a combination cloudburst and hailstorm which pounded sections of the city but ignored other districts.

Liquor Allowances in British Columbia Cut

VICTORIA, B. C., April 29.—(CP)—Liquor Commissioner W. F. Kennedy announced today that beginning next Monday British Columbians would be limited to

one purchase of liquor per month, to consist of either 20 ounces of spirits, one dozen pints of beer, or two quarts of wine. Regulations in effect up to yesterday allowed permit-holders to buy up to 40 ounces of spirits, one dozen pints of beer and a quart of wine during March and April.
