DR. CHARLES A. EDWARDS

The Rev. Daniel A. Poling, pastor of the Baptist Temple in Philadelphia and president of the International Society of Christian Endeavor, is visiting the theaters of war in Europe and Africa. Reporting on the conduct of American soldiers he says: I haven't seen a single man in the American uniform under the influence of liquor, not in thirty-four days and traveling throughout England, Scotland and Ireland, and I have kept a pretty sharp lookout. With few exceptions, and the exceptions are very few indeed, "The American troops are a decent, fine lot, a credit to their country and welcome guests in British homes," said one of the leading generals of Great Britain. "There are more invitations from our English families than there are service men available at any one time to fill them, and that has been true in North Ireland and in Scotland. We are a reserved people and certainly we would not continue our hospitality to those who abused it. Your American soldier men have been appreciative guests." How fine this speaks for our soldier boys. God grant it may continue for the duration, this splendid example set by our American soldiers across the seas. Amen.

Lime Supply Assured Farmers of Oregon

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 29.—(AP)—Up to 21,000 tons of lime will be available to help maintain the war production strength of Oregon farm land this year, the state AAA office reported today in announcing the acceptance of contracts from five northwest plants for that amount of agricultural limestone. Lime will be distributed to farmers under the AAA conservation materials program, with the cost to be deducted from each farmer's conservation payments. Last year Oregon farmers used this program to obtain 13,500 tons of limestone, improving soil productivity on 10,000 acres.

Four Entries Split Pool On Tanana Ice Break-Up

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, April 30.—(AP)—Four entries in the annual guessing contest on the day and minute the ice begins to move in the Tanana river are eligible for a split in the \$80,000 "kitty." The ice stopped the automatic clock at Nenana at 7:22 p. m. Wednesday. None of the guesses entered hit the right time. Three of the winners picked 7:21 and one listed 7:23.

The tickets of the lucky guessers bore these names: August Juntunen and Marjo Lester of Anchorage; "Foster Pool" of Juneau; Allen W. Less, Fairbanks, and "21 men," with a Fairbanks address.

Prices Raised on Logs In Overtime Production

SEATTLE, April 30.—(AP)—The OPA has authorized western Oregon and western Washington contract loggers who operate 48 hours a week to make the same maximum price increases which sellers of west coast logs have been permitted to make since last September for production under overtime conditions.

The effect of the order, Dr. James K. Hall, state OPA price officer explained, is to allow the sellers of logs to pass on the additional receipts to the contract loggers who actually incurred the overtime expense.

The specific additions to price ceilings are \$1.00 per thousand feet under a 48 hour schedule; \$1.50 if produced under 54-hour operations, and \$2.00 for 60-hour work-week conditions.

Divorced Father Sought In Slaying of Child

PORT ORCHARD, Wash., April 29.—(AP)—Authorities today redoubled their search for Joseph Henry DeHaven, 35, Puget Sound navy yard shipfitter, after his 4-year-old daughter, Donna Rae, died of a bullet between her eyes. Prosecutor Fred B. Cohen said the shooting occurred during the night at Silverdale and was discovered when Mrs. DeHaven

came home about 2 a. m., and heard the child moaning. The DeHavens were divorced last Monday. Mrs. DeHaven charged cruelty and that DeHaven threatened to kill her and the child.

Students "Strike" at Toledo School Ended

TOLEDO, Ore., April 29.—(AP) A student "strike" at Taft high school ended yesterday with return of approximately 100 pupils to their desks after a four-day absence in protest to next year's faculty recommendations.

The demonstration ended after 600 persons from the region held a mass meeting to settle the controversy.

A citizen's committee headed by A. A. Kerry of Taft, logging executive, will meet with a Taft school committee to demand rehiring of present faculty members, including City Superintendent H. E. Hermanson, or resignation of the school committee.

The mass meeting voted support to the present faculty. Hermanson urged resumption of studies pending settlement.
