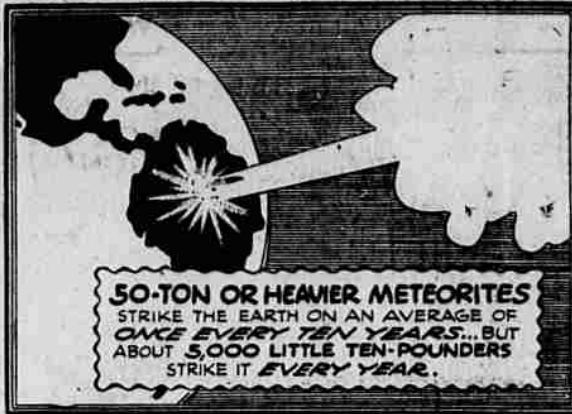

floor and lobby is the next step planned by the owner, in his attempt to solve as much of the housing shortage as one man presumably can.

The old pool hall has been converted into living quarters, the lower floor having been divided into three apartments, while the upper is devoted to bachelor's rooms.

Very few dilapidated houses are in evidence in Sutherlin, the owners having "fixed" them up presently, and rented them. Rents have increased from 35% to 50%, I was informed.

FHA has been contacted in an effort to secure government aid for a building project; but so far unsuccessfully.

Mills run buses to Roseburg and back, to pick up and return workmen; but Roseburg has a housing problem, too.

Along with the housing shortage, Sutherlin has a manpower shortage. The mills are crying for men. A recent survey showed that 150 more men were needed—but where to put them? The countryside for ten, fifteen miles from town, has no vacant houses.

Tents? Well, maybe; but did you ever try living in a tent, for more than a few days at a time? It ain't no fun, brother.

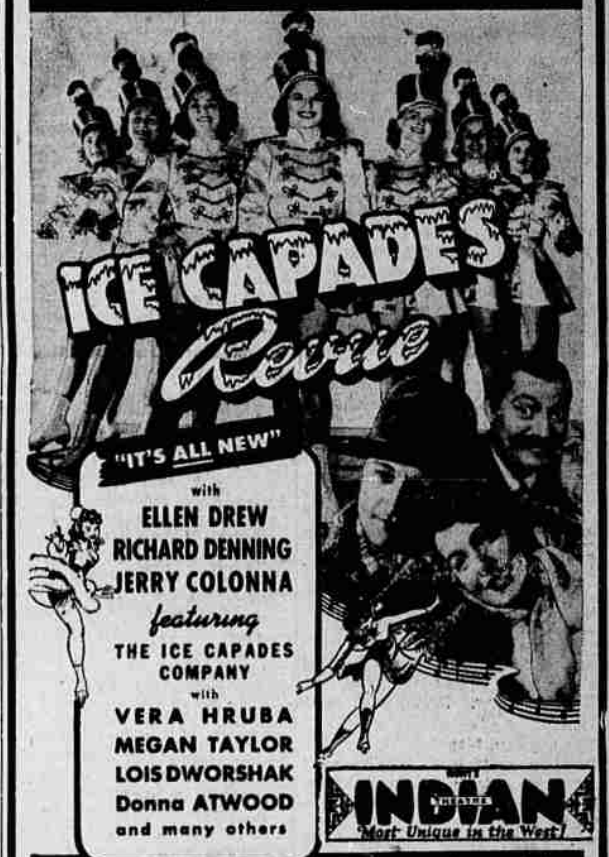
A. J. Tuck Moving to Rochester, New York
