Strike Halts Florida City's Transportation

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 6.—(AP)—Public transportation in the Jacksonville metropolitan area, embracing 295,000 persons, was thrown out of gear today when 175 buses of the Motor Transit company ceased operation as the result of a machinists' strike, involving 60 workmen.

Some curtailment of production may result from the tie-up, shipyard spokesmen said.

Federal Conciliator Newcomb Barco reported the only hope for an early settlement lay in the issuance of a back-to-work directive by the War Labor board.

Barco said the strike resulted from a jurisdictional dispute between two AFL affiliates—the International Association of Machinists and the Amalgamated Association of Street, Electric and Motor Coach Employees.

Stalin Favors Strong, Independent Poland

MOSCOW, May 6.—(AP)—Establishment of a strong and independent Poland after the defeat of Germany was advocated by Premier Stalin in a letter to Ralph Parker, New York Times correspondent, made public here today by Tass, soviet official news agency, and broadcast by the Moscow radio.

Stalin added that should the Polish people so desire, post-war relations between Poland and the U. S. S. R. should be based "upon the fundamental of an alliance providing for mutual assistance against the Germans as the chief enemies of the soviet union and Poland."

Restaurant Prices to Be Posted This Month

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—(AP)—Posting requirements of the restaurant maximum price regulation will go into effect May 15, the OPA has announced.

All eating and drinking establishments in California, Oregon and Washington must post a statement that their price ceilings are their highest prices during the seven-day base period, April 10, 1943.

The OPA also announced that control over restaurant prices will be extended to northern Idaho, effective May 10.

Florida Bill Aims for Two-Way Alimony Law

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., May 6.—(AP)—Husbands as well as wives can sue for alimony in Florida if a bill passed yesterday by the state senate is enacted into law.

Such a provision was written by amendment into a bill to give married women the right to manage their own property. The amendment, proposed by Senator Hal Y. Haines of Lake Butler, also would grant "courtesy rights" to a husband when property is left by his wife. They correspond to a widow's dower rights.

Senator Haines said the amendment gives both husband and wife equal property rights, and remarked that if a woman has the same privileges as her husband, "then she should be under the same obligation" in payment of alimony or for the support of their children.

Scrap Paper Donor Too Liberal by Accident

PORTLAND, May 6.—(AP)—A \$4,000 note, negotiable bonds valued at \$750, paid-up life insurance policies worth \$5,000 and a mortgage were missed by a Portlander whose identity was not disclosed.

The loser remembered suddenly that the Salvation army called last Friday for some cast-off articles. A six-hour search yesterday through a ton of scrap paper yielded the missing documents, accidentally included with the contribution to the Salvation Army.

Fresh Fish Allocation Awaits Ceiling Prices

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(AP)—Secretary of the Interior Ickes, one of whose sidelines is being "coordinator of fisheries," said yesterday he is working on a plan to allocate fresh fish for use whenever OPA puts ceiling prices

on those products.

Ickes said that when uniform prices are fixed on fish some machinery will be needed to determine what purchasers will get which boat load. Normally, this distribution takes care of itself by purchasers bidding for fish.

OPA has set prices on Tuna and Tuna-like species, and has announced plans for ceiling prices on other types.

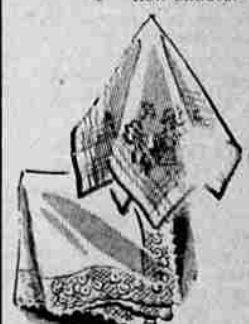
