

Farmers Using Credit To Boost Food Production

Determination of Pacific north-west farmers to meet their 1943 food for freedom goals is reflected in their use of credit so far this year. R. E. Brown, general agent of the Farm Credit administration of Spokane, said here Saturday.

Continued high production of essential war crops by Production Credit association members is indicated, Mr. Brown reported, by the fact they are borrowing at the same rate they did last year—about \$125,000 a day. In the first three months of 1943 loans by the 30 Production Credit associations in the northwest totaled more than \$9,500,000—almost exactly the amount loaned in the same period last year.

Federal Intermediate Credit bank discounts, which reflect not only Production Credit association borrowings, but also some additional livestock and fruit operations, are running slightly ahead of last year, and amounted to approximately \$10,235,000 for the first quarter.

Cooperative associations are using far more credit this year than last to finance larger production at higher costs and to anticipate seasonal needs earlier. Credit extended to them by the Spokane Bank for Cooperatives in the first quarter of 1943 exceeded the amount loaned in the first three months of 1942 by 62 per cent.

Even farm mortgage loans, which have been in slack demand for some time, are picking up, Mr. Brown reported. Loans by the Federal Land bank and the Land Bank commissioner in the first three months this year were up 16 per cent over the same period a year ago.

The Regional Agricultural Credit corporation, re-established this year to finance emergency war time food and fiber needs, is lending for food production at a rate of approximately \$50,000 a day in the Pacific northwest, Mr. Brown said.

These loans are made through United States Department of Agriculture War boards, with Farm Credit units in Spokane handling fiscal details.

So far, Mr. Brown reported, 86 per cent of the loans, which now total nearly \$2,000,000, have been made to small farmers whose credit requirements are less than \$2,500 each.
