FORMER ROSEBURG TEACHER IS MARRIED AT ANCHORAGE, ALASKA

Announcement is made of the marriage of Miss Mary Elizabeth Holaday to Captain Richard Rush Murray, Signal Corps, United States army, assistant engineering officer of the Alaska Communication system.

Mrs. Murray is the daughter of Mrs. Joseph A. Holaday, of Eugene, Ore., and was graduated from Oregon college of Education and Oregon State college. She resigned her position as English instructor at the Roseburg Junior high school in 1941 to become the remedial supervisor in the schools of Ketchikan, Alaska. Relinquishing from this post, she traveled by plane through the Yukon territory to White Horse and from there to Anchorage, where he was married to Captain Murray at All Saints Episcopal church.

Mrs. Murray is the granddaughter of the late John and Mary Overholzer, pioneer school teachers of Oregon, and the late Anna and Mary Holaday, pioneer settlers of Columbia county, Ore.

Captain Murray, who is the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Spencer Murray, of Catskill, New York, was graduated from the Signal school, United States Army, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey, and from the University of Vermont. He is a descendant of Benjamin Rush and Richard Stockton, signers of the Declaration of Independence on his mother's side, as well as two Colonial New England Governors and from Richard Rush, attorney general secretary of the Treasury under President Madison, and U. S. minister to England under President Monroe, and from 1817-825, director of the Smithsonian institute and United States minister to France under President Franklin Pierce in 1848-51.

Captain Murray's father was noted for outstanding achievements in the electrical engineering profession and was awarded the Gold Medal of the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia and an honorary degree of Doctor of Engineering by his Alma Mater, Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Pa. He pioneered alternating current allway electrification on the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad between New York and New Haven, Conn., and built a hydro-electric power installation in South Carolina, which at the time, included the largest arth dam in the world, the Lake Murray-Saluda Dam Development. The lake was named for Mr. Murray by unanimous resolution of the South Carolina legislature in 1927.

The marriage of Captain and Mrs. Murray terminates a romance that began, when Mrs. Murray attended the 1941 summer session at University of Washington and Captain Murray was stationed with the Alaska Communication System in Seattle. After spending the winter in Alaska, Mrs. Murray plans to

leave shortly traveling through Canada to spend the summer with her mother at 728 W. 19th Street, Eugene, Ore., and with Captain Murray's relatives in South Carolina, Connecticut and New York City.
