Virden and Mrs. Jennie Wharton. These ladies serve on the various wards at the Facility several hours each week. The patients are most appreciative of this service and look eagerly forward to each visit.

When this war is over there will be a long period of human repair work to be done, and the patience and training of the Gray Ladies will be needed and appreciated more than ever.

Hospital and Recreation Corps (Gray Ladies)—The service of the Hospital and Recreation Corps is an outgrowth of war work rendered by the American Red Cross to hospitalized veterans and service men. The name "Gray Lady," conferred by the patients, was suggested by the gray uniforms worn by members of the corps.

The Hospital and Recreation Corps of the Volunteer Special Services is designated to provide friendly and helpful services for the sick and convalescent in army and navy hospitals. Since the corps is concerned with the morale of hospitalized patients, its duties are not to be confused with those of professional nurses or medical social workers. Because the corps supplements the professional service of Red Cross medical social units, the regulations governing its functions, organization, and policies have been co-ordinated with military authorities through services to the armed forces. Under professional supervision, the members of the corps provide friendly and helpful services for the sick and convalescent army and navy hospitals. Regulations governing the work of the Hospital and Recreation Corps are essentially the same in all federal hospitals—army, navy, marine and veteran.

The manger of the Veterans hospital at Roseburg, realizing the need of increased membership of the present corps of Gray Ladies, on account of the increased number of patients at the facility, desires a class organized soon, so there will be no suspension of the service.

In order to be a member of the Hospital and Recreation Corps, the woman applicant must be over 21 years of age, an American citizen, a member of the Red Cross, and have a well balanced type of personality that is so necessary in building morale of the sick and convalescent. 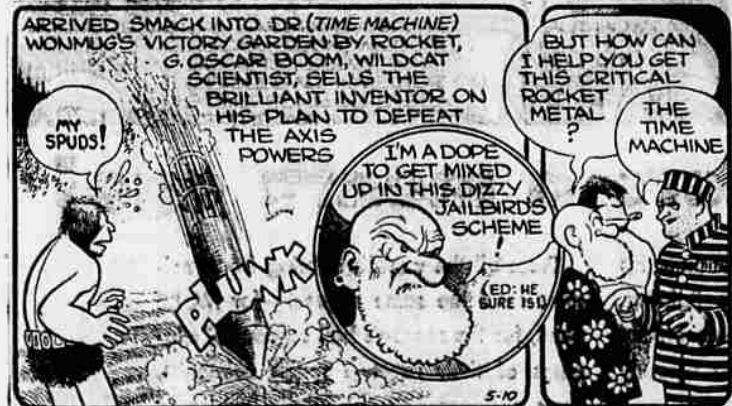
