Train Wreckage Being Removed

The work of clearing away the wreckage of the passenger train derailed last Saturday near Oakland was proceeding today. It was necessary to construct a spur track to the flat ground on which the locomotive came to rest after plunging down a steep embankment dragging five coaches off the right of way.

A county road crew and several Oakland residents have been busy since the wreck recovering hundreds of gallons of fuel oil drained from the overturned tender. The oil followed a small watercourse, in which a dam was constructed to prevent the oil from flowing into Calapooia creek.

The county court, unable to obtain fuel oil for road surfacing purposes, has had a salvage crew at work and has recovered more than 1200 gallons of the escaping oil which will be used in road work. Several residents of the area also have filled all available containers.

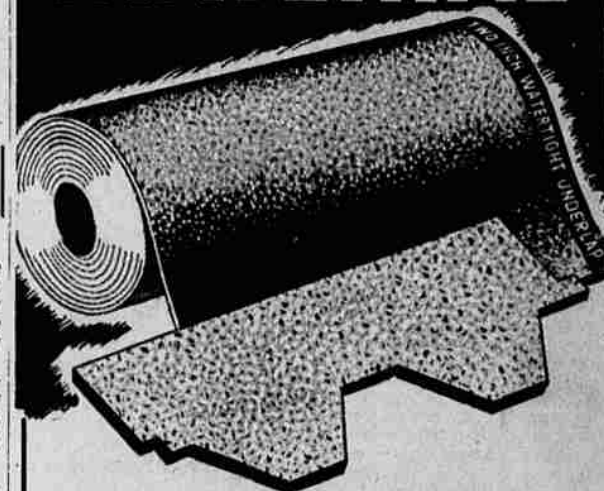

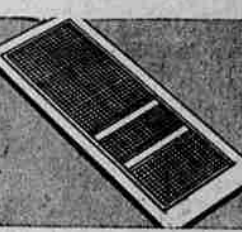
