Resignation of Ickes' Aide Rejected by F. R.

WASHINGTON, May 12.—(AP)—President Roosevelt refused yesterday to accept the resignation of Abe Fortas, declaring this draft age official could best serve his country "by continuing to do your job as undersecretary of interior."

Secretary Ickes handed Fortas' resignation to the president Friday, saying in an accompanying letter that he knew the undersecretary had submitted it "only because he did not want me or the administration to suffer as a result of possible attacks upon him for remaining in a civilian post."

Mr. Roosevelt, in a letter to the undersecretary, said he appreciated his motives but would not accept the resignation.

Ickes had written the president that Fortas is second in command of the interior department, had been given general jurisdiction over its activities, and "is doing a splendid job."

Pendleton Couple Hurt In Collision of Autos

OREGON CITY, Ore., May 12.—(AP)—Mr. and Mrs. C. R. McRoberts of Pendleton apparently were recovering today from injuries suffered in a head-on automobile collision Monday night on the Oswego-Wilsonville highway. Oregon City hospital attendants said Mrs. McRoberts suffered fractures of both legs and her husband suffered a fractured shoulder and cuts.

Deputy Sheriff E. L. Bacon said cars driven by McRoberts and Burton J. Gilpin of Lake Grove collided.
