Advisory Board On Truck Transport is Appointed Here

A Roseburg Maintenance Advisory committee has been formed to aid the motor transport industry in Roseburg and nearby communities preserve existing trucking equipment. It was announced today by Jim H. Busch, district manager of ODT's division of motor transport.

Busch said that the meeting of company executives was called by truck and bus operators because of the increasingly difficult motor maintenance problems brought about by the war.

The committee will investigate maintenance problems as related to manpower shortages, the supply part situation and check on equipment laid up for various reasons.

Busch declared that the committee chairman, Si Dillard of Dillard Motor company, requested every truck operator in the Roseburg area having information on parts, manpower or related matter affecting maintenance to contact the committee at once.

This committee was formed to make a study of existing maintenance facilities and the availability of mechanical help.

The information and suggestions of this group will be presented directly to the Office of Defense Transportation in Washington, D. C., for consideration relative to the solving of transportation problems, Busch stated.

Linfield College Teachings Target At Baptist Meet

Trustees Directed to Probe Charges; Rev. H. P. Sconce, Clyde Beard Get Posts

SALEM, Ore., May 14.—(AP)—Trustees of Linfield college today were under orders of the Oregon Baptist convention to investigate charges that "unchristian teachings" were practiced at the church's McMinnville institution.

A resolution adopted by the convention demanded an early report by an investigating committee and condemned the trustees for their delay in probing the charges, made several months ago.

The convention also resolved to sever relations with the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America. The resolution said the convention was "out of sympathy with the program and doctrinal implications sponsored by the interdenominational agency. The council's removal from the denominational budget was recommended although individual churches would be permitted to contribute funds if they desired."

Prohibition of the manufacture, sale and transportation of alcoholic beverages for the duration of the war was demanded by the convention and the federal government was asked to arrange for the shipment of food for the children of occupied European countries.

Dr. Irving Fox, pastor of Salem's First Baptist church, was named convention president. The 1944 session will be held in Portland and the Rev. H. P. Sconce, Roseburg, was elected convention preacher.

During discussion on the Linfield resolution, the Rev. Ralph Mulholland, Portland, declared, "if two members of the board of trustees and two or three members of the faculty had the grace to withdraw from their positions, the situation would clarify itself." These persons, who were not mentioned by name, should be replaced by "real Bible-believing Baptists," he urged.

Other officers elected by the convention: Dr. George Winslow, Bend, vice-president; Rev. Russell Thomas, Portland, recording secretary; Dr. O. C. Wright, Portland, historical secretary, and Dr. W. O. Sims, Portland, treasurer.

Dr. E. B. Hart, Corvallis; Mrs. W. C. Martin, Cottage Grove; Paul Claussen, Albany; Clyde Beard, Roseburg; Mrs. R. K. Hackett, Grants Pass; Rev. Alfred Danielson, Bend; Kohler Butts, Athena, and Mrs. Ethel Burns, Newberg, were named to the convention's board of directors.

Trustees elected for the Western Baptist Theological seminary were: Dr. F. W. Starring, Rev. W. H. Fowle and Rev. G. P. Norton, all of Portland, and Rev. Mr. Sconce.

Six were nominated for two positions on the Linfield board of trustees—Dr. Albert G. Johnson, Dr. F. B. Matthews and Starring, all of Portland; Mrs. Frank N. Parent, Oceanlake; Dr. Hugh Dowd, Salem, and Almo Chase, Springfield. Two will be elected by the board.

Mussolini Ousts Six From Fascist Party

LONDON, May 14.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini has expelled six more fascist officials from the party, the Rome radio reported today, in a continuation of a shakeup in Italy.

One of those ousted was reported to be Luigi Mossadaglia, described as a senator and a party member since Nov. 19, 1925. He was accused of expressing "pernicious and cowardly sentiments."

Carlo Scorza, fascist party secretary, was said in the broadcast to have referred the cases "to the committee for police measures."

Three of those ousted were accused of illegal activities in awards of government contracts.

Navy Cargo Pier Fire Injures Score of Persons

SAN FRANCISCO, May 14.—(AP)—More than a score of persons were injured, none seriously, and at least 150 were overcome by smoke in the fire which burned through creosote-soaked piling under a navy cargo pier here yesterday.

Eighteen firemen and 12 coast

guardsmen suffered burns and injuries that required hospital treatment and 100 coast guardsmen and some 50 civilians were treated for smoke injuries.

No cargo was lost or damaged, the navy said. The pier itself was in such condition the navy planned to move the cargo back to day.

Legion Chief to Quit If Lewis Apology Stands

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 14.—(AP)—The Pennsylvania Legion post which apologized to John L. Lewis will resign as national commander of the American Legion, he declared here last night in an address to the Florida state convention.

The Pennsylvania post, South Fork No. 653, adopted resolutions recently apologizing to Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers, for a denunciation by Waring. The Legion commander immediately asked for an investigation.

Waring said he was in favor of unionism—"the kind that appeals to honest, patriotic American citizens, not the ilk led by John L. Lewis."
